NMSU Extension relays this information to residents by offering programming in the areas of Agriculture, Natural Resources, Family and Consumer Sciences, and 4-H Youth Development. There is an Extension Office in every county in the state of New Mexico.

The Bernalillo County Extension Office is one of NMSU's 33 "satellite" offices. There are five full time extension agents, two administrative assistants, and several part time staff members.

Statewide On Farm Food Safety

The agent delivered On Farm Food Safety classes through the NMDA - Produce Safety Alliance (PSA) online classes each month as well as with the New Mexico Farmers Marketing Association Tier 1 and 2 training. These trainings teach farmers about the hazards and risks for food safety and food-borne illness associated with growing fresh fruits and vegetables. In New Mexico, local institutions, i.e. schools, early childhood centers, and senior centers, receive state funding to purchase New Mexican grown produce. These institutions require the farmers to receive education training, but also submit a food safety plan to be reviewed prior to purchasing. The agent helps the farmers with these food safety requirements and reviews, which enables the farmers to sell to local institutions while fulfilling the institutional requirements for food safety. Unofficial purchases of local produce was estimated at about \$1 million of which \$450K was reimbursed by the state. Also, these food safety education and farm reviews are allowing more producers to sell at local retail grocery stores or local food hubs and aggregators.

Agriculture Education

The Ag agent collaborated with NMSU Aquaponic specialist and Santa Fe Community College to deliver beginning Aquaponics workshops including a 4 week online education series and an in-person training in Santa Fe. 66 people attended the online training with 15 people inperson.

The Ag and Horticulture Agents continued to participate and deliver programs with the NMSU Ready, Set, Grow webinar series hosted by the NMSU Horticulture Specialist. This monthly program reached over 1500 people in 2022 teaching them varying topics of horticulture, agriculture, growing food, and much more.

Community Development

Horticultural Outreach The Village of Los

In 2022, the Bernalillo County Cooperative Extension Services (BCCES) collaborated with Camino De Vida Christian Church. Their members are primarily from Guatemala. Pastor Carmen and Pastor Guillermo contacted the Horticulture Agent and started to develop a Horticulture program for the church members to participate in and build their own community garden. All classes and materials were provided in **English and Spanish** languages.

In January 2022, Nissa collaborated with the APS Coordinated School Health Department to reach out to all APS school gardens via email offering them free seeds in an effort to re-start their gardens post COVID. 47 schools accepted the offer. Nissa also provided assistance directly to 27 schools.

Ranchos: "Aligning Our

Aligning Ou AgriFuture"

The Village of Los Ranchos continues the Aligning our AgriFuture project through the Strategic Doing process by engaging the public. Extension has participated in a number of convenings to which the need for educational trainings arose. The Ag agent collaborated with the village to host workshops on various topics including fruit trees, grapes, soil health, composting, plant diseases/pest management, and seasonal gardening. The agent assisted with various youth educational related agricultural activities.





Program Highlights

Adventures in Leadership Camp:

The New Mexico 4-H Adventures in Leadership Camp is a camp targeted at Air Force connected youth. Thirty-one Air Force connected youth from across the country attended the camp. Approximately one-third of youth in attendance were from states other than New Mexico. Camp activities included healthy living programming, 4-H project exploration stations, sewing, woodworking, high ropes course and whitewater rafting.

4-H on Base:

The Bernalillo County 4-H Military Partnership works with Air Force the National Guard to provide 4-H programming to military-connected youth on installation. 4-H Agents provide military-connected youth with scholarships to attend state level leadership events, summer camps, project exploration days, and professional development for youth center staff. Youth participated in several activities, including STEM, leathercrafting, and baking biscochitos.

Garden Kits Project:

More than 30 garden kits were handed out in 2022. Youth were able to choose from a variety of kits, such as salsa kits, herb garden kits, or cut flower kits. Each youth member was also given a Garden Project Guide to help them through each phase of the process from seed starting to harvest.

Turkey Bingo:

County Council raised \$5,000 for agricultural equipment to be used by the county and 4-H youth who would otherwise not have access to specialized equipment.

Family and Consumer Science

National Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences 2022 Hall of Fame



Family and Consumer Sciences continued strong programming and impacts during the third year of the pandemic. Many programs returned to in-person classes, though a wide variety of online programs were also offered.

Cindy Schlenker-Davies, retired FCS Agent and Program Director, was inducted into the NEAFCS Hall of Fame in recognition of her long-time dedication to the field. The "Stress Management and Resiliency Programs," a webinar trilogy presented throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, was awarded first place at the state level and also won national awards.

Wellness Programming

Kitchen Creations

Throughout the year, three 4 week sessions were offered to **180** participants statewide. In 2022, Kitchen Creations pivoted back to in-person sessions. This program is made possible by strong collaborations with agents statewide, the American Diabetes Association, and the NM Department of Health Diabetes Prevention and Control Program.

• 100% of participants reported they were satisfied with the classes and understood the strategies to plan and prepare healthy meals.

Eating Well With Diabetes

In Summer 2022, a three session series, Growing and Cooking: Leafy Greens (June), Summer Squashes (July), and Tomatoes (August) was held

- 100% of participants reported a deeper understanding of how to grow, shop for, store, and cook the vegetables discussed.
- 82% reported they would grow these vegetables in the next twelve months

Walk With Ease

Five 6 week programs focused on reducing arthritis pain and improving overall health.

- **50** residents reported they would change their practices based on what they learned
- **100%** planned to continue walking after the class ended

National Diabetes Prevention Program (NDPP)

A year long program for people with pre-diabetes to reduce their risk of developing Type 2 Diabetes through diet and exercise.

- 100% reported increase in healthy habits citing eating more non-starchy vegetables, being more physically active, having strategies for managing their weight, and having a more positive and resilient mindset towards continuing a healthy lifestyle.
- 100% reported weight loss of 3-13 pounds

Walk With Ease

Five 6 week programs focused on reducing arthritis pain and improving overall health.

- 50 residents reported they would change their practices based on what they learned
- **100%** planned to continue walking after the class ended

Living Well with Inflation

A four week statewide virtual webinar series created in partnership with a team of Extension agents from across the state.

- **100%** agreed they better understood the impacts inflation has on their lives
- **95%** agreed they learned specific strategies and tools to deal with the impacts of inflation



Extension Association

In 2022, the 18 members of the Bernalillo County Extension Association contributed thousands of hours of their time to the community. They also donated \$2,192.30 to Extension and \$119,020.00 to the community.

FCS Program Highlights

- Cindy Davies was inducted into the NEAFCS Hall of Fame
- The "Stress Management and Resiliency Program," a trilogy presented through the pandemic, won First Place in the State and also won awards at the National level
- The FCS area was awarded a General Mills grant for programming in Bernalillo County
- The FCS program maintained strong community partnerships with Roadrunner Food Bank, Crossroads for Women, and the New Mexico Diabetes Advisory

Master Food Preservers

For the past several years, home food preservation has become a popular DIY project. With the increased number of people preserving food at home, it is vital for research based food safety information to be available to home canners.

Food Preservation classes were back in person in the summer of 2022! The pressure canning classes were the most popular, as many new gardeners wanted to preserve their precious harvest.
