Master Gardeners

Statewide

On Farm Food Safety

The agent delivered On Farm Food Safety classes through the NMDA - Produce Safety Alliance (PSA) online classes each month as well as with the New Mexico Farmers Marketing Association Tier 1 and 2 training. These trainings teach farmers about the hazards and risks for food safety and food-borne illness associated with growing fresh fruits and vegetables. In New Mexico, local institutions, i.e. schools, early childhood centers, and senior centers, receive state funding to purchase New Mexican grown produce. These institutions require the farmers to receive education training, but also submit a food safety plan to be reviewed prior to purchasing. The agent helps the farmers with these food safety requirements and reviews, which enables the farmers to sell to local institutions while fulfilling the institutional requirements for food safety. Unofficial purchases of local produce by schools and state institutions was estimated at over \$1 million. Also, these food safety education and farm reviews are allowing more producers to sell at local retail grocery stores or local food hubs and aggregators.



Community Development

S.A.R.E

In 2023, Bernalillo County Extension in conjunction with S.A.R.E. - Sustainability Agriculture – Research – **Education and NMSU Extension Plant Sciences** collaborated with the Los Ranchos Agri-Nature Center and Rio Grande Community Farm to host a two-day sustainable agriculture workshop demonstrating soil health, integrated pest management, irrigation for an arid climate, farm tools for small acreage, and various topics for smallscale and sustainable agriculture producers.

Grow the Growers

The Extension Agriculture Agent continues to support the Bernalillo County 'Grow the Growers' farm incubation program at Gutiérrez-Hubbell House. The agent teaches farm business and food safety classes; leads field walk throughs for disease, pest, and weed issues; answers questions; and provides overall support to the program.



The Village of Los Ranchos:

"Aligning Our AgriFuture"

The Village of Los Ranchos continues the Aligning our AgriFuture project through the Strategic Doing process by engaging the public. Extension has participated in a number of convenings during which the need for educational trainings arose. The Ag agent collaborated with the village to host workshops on various topics including fruit trees, grapes, soil health, composting, plant diseases/pest management, and seasonal gardening. The agent assisted with various youth educational related agricultural activities.

Agriculture Education

The Ag Agent spoke about on-farm food safety at the National Aquaponics Conference held in Santa Fe.

The Agent speaks regularly for workshops at the Agri-Nature Center of Los Ranchos, the Albuquerque Garden Center, various garden clubs, and the Gutierrez-Hubbell House.

The Agent continues to coorganizes the Ready, Set, Grow webinar series which continues to grow and reach new audiences. The Agent steadily answers questions via phone, walkins, and email, as well as conducting regular site visits.

Program Highlights

Pinto World:

Agents took eleven youth, aged 9 to 15, to the Pinto World Championship Show in Tulsa, Oklahoma. At this event, the youth competed in horse judging and speech competitions. In the horse judging competition, the 13 and under team achieved an impressive 5th place overall, while the 14-18 team secured the 11th position out of 22 teams. In the speech competition, the youth excelled, earning one world champion title, four reserve world champion titles, and six top-five titles.

4-H Military Program:

By annually applying for the 4-H Military Partnership grant, we opened opportunities for military-connected • 168 Youth youth to benefit from full scholarships. These scholarships allowed them to participate in state-level events and actively contribute to 4-H projects on Base. In the grant secured for the year 2023, a total of \$29,750 was allocated, facilitating programs in collaboration with the New Mexico Army National Guard and Kirtland Air Force Base.

Garden Kits Project:

More than 20 garden kits were handed out in 2023. Youth were able to choose from a variety of kits, such as salsa kits, herb garden kits, or cut flower kits. Each youth member was also given a Garden Project Guide to help them through each phase of the process from seed starting to harvest.

Food Challenge:

Hosting food and healthy living workshops lead to a 20% increase in participation of food and nutrition education related opportunities. For 2023, 18 youth participated in the State Food Challenge, increasing from 8 the previous year. Youth stated a 95% increase in food preparation and nutrition knowledge from the beginning to end of the programming period.

4-H Schools: Winner of the Western Extension Directors Association for Excellence in Programming for a Team

Family and Consumer Science

Family and Consumer Sciences continued strong programming and impacts in 2024.

Dianne continued to serve on the NEAFCS National Board as Western Region Director. She also won a College of Agricultural, Consumer, Environmental Sciences (ACES) Team Award and First Place for the New Mexico Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences Financial Management Award.





Family and Consumer Sciences Programming

Kitchen Creations

Throughout the year, four 4 week sessions were offered. This program is made possible by strong collaborations with agents statewide, the American Diabetes Association, and the NM Department of Health Diabetes Prevention and Control Program.

• 100% of participants (235 statewide) reported they were satisfied with the classes and 99% understood the strategies to plan and prepare healthy meals.

National Diabetes Prevention Program (NDPP)

Two cohorts (42 weekly sessions) provided to underserved residents at the TenderLove Community Center, serving unhoused women and those coming out of incarceration, and First Nations Community HealthSource, serving urban Native Americans.

- 100% cited feeling positive about their abilities to eat healthy as a result of the program
- 100% reported weight loss of 1-20 pounds

Mind Matters

Over the course of twelve weeks, participants were taught stress management tools and learned to address their physical, relational, and mental health needs in this webinar.

Med Instead of Meds

A six week webinar course designed to help participants explore the Mediterranean Diet. This program was offered as a collaboration between Bernalillo CES and five other counties around the state.

Home Food Preservation

Over six months in 2023, fifteen public classes and five public workshops were offered in a variety of home food preservation topics, including canning, dehydrating, freezing, freezedrying, fermentation, and pickling.

 90.62% of reporting participants plan to practice home food preservation within the next six months as a result of attending





Master Food Preservers

The in-person training program for Master Food Preservers relaunched to the state for the first time in five years. The initial cohort will have fifteen participants who will attend an eleven week adult continuing education and professional development program.

The Master Food Preservers program in Bernalillo County will also have trained additional educators in five counties across the state to hold food preservation education for the public and facilitate an ongoing trainer program.

Extension Association

In 2023, the members of the Bernalillo County Extension Association contributed 5,651 community service hours, reaching 9,300 people. They also donated \$103,632 in financial support to the community.

FCS Program Highlights

- Three grants were awarded for 2024 Innovative Programming: Making a Living on 5 Acres or Less (\$16,500), Fermentation for the Future (\$12,600), and Master Food Preservers (\$1,500)
- The FCS area was awarded a General Mills HomeTown Grant Making Program for programming in Bernalillo County (\$15,000)
- The FCS program maintained strong community partnerships with Roadrunner Food Bank, TenderLove Community Center, Crossroads for Women, South Valley Economic Development Center, UNM Southwest Mesa Clinic, Village of Los Ranchos Agri-Nature Center, Alzheimer's Association, ABQ Mainstreet (Downtown Arts & Culture), and the New Mexico Diabetes Advisory Council
- Dianne presented a poster at the Joint Council of Extension Professionals Extension Leadership Conference
- Amber collaborated with NMSU Innovative Media under the guidance of Nancy Flores, Extension Food Technology Specialist to create a video about Making Prickly Pear Cactus Juice. Cindy Schelenker-Davies, retired BCCES County Director, leant her years of experience to help prepare for the video, and Joseph Delgado, BCCES Horticulture Agent, assisted with harvesting the tunas for the video.
- Western Region Mental Health and Nutrition Network: Dianne presented at the Conference and participates in a Work Group

Ideas for Cooking and Nutrition (ICAN)

ICAN is a nutrition education program of New Mexico State University. Our mission is to inspire New Mexico's limited-resource families to make healthy food and lifestyle choices, and to make those choices possible by creating health-friendly communities. To help us achieve this goal, ICAN is federally funded by USDA grant programs such as EFNEP.



In **2023**, ICAN reached **33,000** clients at **240** locations across New Mexico.
