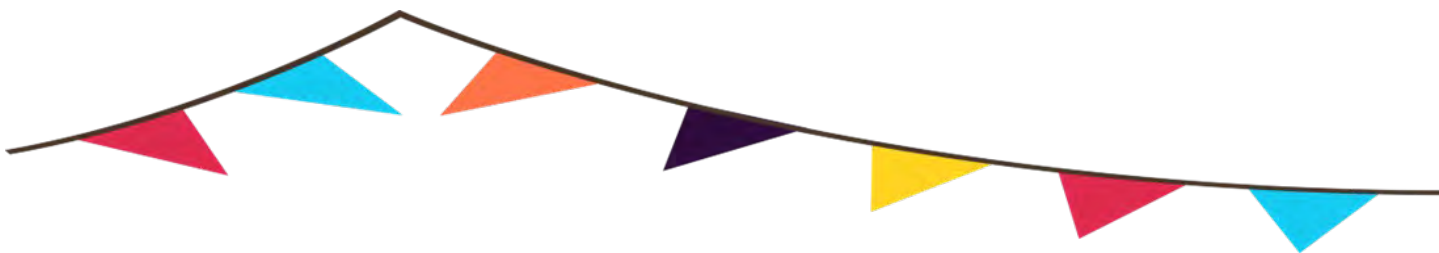

RULES FOR BERNALILLO COUNTY FAIR

Suggestions for improving our Fair shall be submitted in writing to the Fair board, 1510 Menaul NW, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87107 prior to November 1st. Suggestions after that date will be considered for the following fair. Each constructive suggestion will be considered by the Fair board. An answer in writing will be sent informing you of the action taken. Please sign your letter and give your return mailing address, including zip code.

1. The Bernalillo County Fair will be held at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds.
2. All 4-H exhibitors must have been enrolled in 4-H and the respective project by May 1. All Youth Hall exhibitors must be enrolled 4-H members in Bernalillo County by May 1 to be eligible to enter exhibits in Youth Hall Departments.
3. The management will not be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits, vehicles, or personal belongings or for accidents, but all precautions will be taken.

BERNALILLO COUNTY 4-H FAIR SPORTSMANSHIP

1. Anyone attending the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair as an exhibitor, parent, spectator, superintendent, judge, or fair official must conduct themselves consistent with the following code listed below. These codes of conduct are not limited to the show ring but apply to all departments, activities, and events associated with the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair. Consequences to violating this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to:
 - Verbal Warning
 - Written Warning
 - Removal from Fairgrounds
 - Suspension, reduction and/or loss of Awards/premiums
 - Suspension, reduction and/or loss of auction proceeds
 - Loss of future show privileges
 - Notification of law enforcement
 - Notification to local fairs as to disciplinary actions taken

CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

1. Exhibitors at the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair shall always comport themselves with honesty, integrity and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to any exhibitor who competes in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. All adult leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Exhibitors and responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction

proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows. The board will use every precaution for the safekeeping of exhibits.

2. The Bernalillo County 4-H Fair will use diligence to ensure the safety of livestock or articles entered for exhibit after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss, injury, or damage done to any article on exhibit. Any exhibitor who, whether in person or by agents, interferes with Fair officials or shows disrespect to them is subject to penalty as the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair Board deems necessary. It is up to the Fair official being harassed to make the official complaint to the Board. The Bernalillo County Fair Board may withhold from such exhibitor all premiums or awards awarded and/or expel him/her from further exhibiting at the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair.

A. ENTRIES

4. **A.** All entries must be submitted through the Fair Entry system by July 02, 2025. See rule 6 for fees. Only one name per entry will be accepted.
B. Mandatory Identification is required for Market Beef, Market Sheep, Market Goats and Market Hogs. Market animals not tagged by the Bernalillo County Extension Agent or Fair Board on or before the date scheduled in the Bernalillo County 4-H Calendar or other means of notification will **not** be eligible to be shown and sold at the fair.
C. *Market animals may be ear tagged by family name until entry in the Bernalillo County Fair. New Mexico State Fair animals must be ear tagged in the specific 4-H Member's name and those animals must be entered in his/her name if shown in the Bernalillo County Fair.*
5. All fees collected will be used to help defray the expenses of the Fair. All fees for A through L, below, are due July 14th, 2025. Fees may be paid in cash (must have exact change) or **Check or money order payable to BERNALILLO COUNTY 4-H FAIR BOARD. Fees may also be processed online in the Fair Entry System, you will be responsible for paying the automatically assessed fee of \$5.00 on any credit/debit card transaction. All fees A through M are nonrefundable.**

6. There is a \$20.00 flat fee for participating in Showmanship, regardless of the number of entries per exhibitor. This fee will cover all Showmanship classes. There is no fee for Exploration age Showmanship, or all other small animal pet show.
7. The fee is \$35.00 for the first horse entered. The fee for additional horses entered is \$5.00 per class and an office fee of \$10.00. Fees are to be paid at the time of entering the Fairgrounds. Stalls will not be available during the show. Plan to show out of your trailer.
8. Parking: Parking is a flat fee of \$15 per family. There will be no parking passes issued.
9. 4-H clubs/exhibitors must furnish their own wheelbarrow, rakes, scoops, etc., in the livestock areas. The State Fair does not furnish these items.
10. Be present to check out exhibits at the scheduled time. Extension office and State Fair are not responsible for exhibits not picked up at end of the fair. All first-place exhibits in youth hall will be held for entry at the state fair.
11. All Youth Hall exhibits must have been completed in the previous 2 years by the exhibitor AND have never been exhibited in any county fair. Exhibitors may not enter any item more than once even if enrolled in the same project again. Exhibitors found to be in violation of this rule will be disqualified from all classes in that project. If found to be in violation of this rule a 2nd time, all projects will be removed from Youth Hall without awards.
12. Any 4-H member may enter county only open classes for which no 4-H project is available but must be enrolled in the project for all other classes.

13. A. Youth Hall Posters

- Maximum size: 14" x 22" (half of a standard poster board).
- Defined as any flat paper, foam board, cardboard, or other backing suitable for wall display.
- No stands permitted—must be wall-appropriate.

B. Youth Hall Display Boards

- Maximum size: 18" x 48" (half of a standard tri-fold display board).
- Defined as scored, freestanding science boards found at school supply stores.
- Must be freestanding by folding in the sides slightly.

C. Other Exhibit Boards

- Base size for three-dimensional vertical displays: No larger than 24" x 24".
- Defined as exhibits with a solid base where the display rises vertically (e.g., Small Engines, Self-Determined, or other 3-D exhibits).

D. Project Specific Boards

- Some projects have specific size guidelines in the project book (e.g., Leathercraft, Braiding).
- If a project book specifies dimensions, members must follow those rules.

E. Photography Entries

- Single Photos:
 - Sizes: 3½" x 5", 4" x 6", or 5" x 7".
 - Must be mounted on an 8" x 10" backing without frames or glass.
 - Include a caption.
- Photo Sets (3-5 photos):
 - Sizes: 3½" x 5" or 4" x 6".
 - Mounted on an 11" x 14" backing (4-5 photos go on a 14" x 22" backing).
 - No frames or glass; each photo must have a caption.
 - Backing must be sturdy enough for transport.
- Photography SD (Self-Determined) Category:
 - Posters and display boards must follow the guidelines listed above.

F. Lego Exhibits

- Base: Must have a sturdy base separate from the one included with Legos.
- Security: Legos must be secured to prevent pieces from falling off when moved.
- Size Limits: No larger than 12" W x 18" L x 16" H.
- Entries exceeding these limits will NOT be accepted—NO EXCEPTIONS.

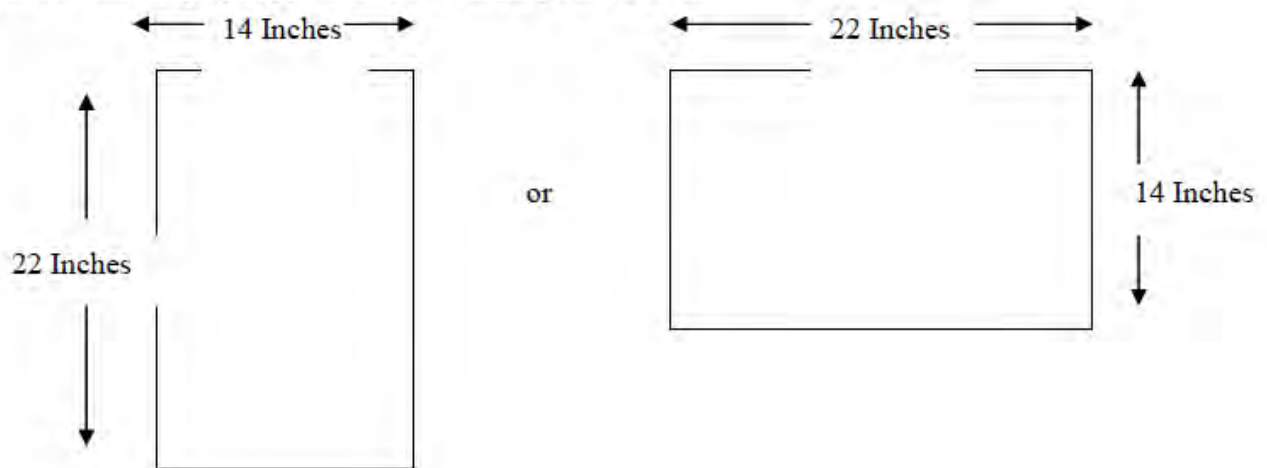
G. Oversized Items

- Due to space and security limitations, extremely large or heavy exhibits (e.g., Woods, Welding) may not be accepted. Oversized items are not guaranteed to be displayed.
- Participants must contact the County Office for approval before submitting large projects.

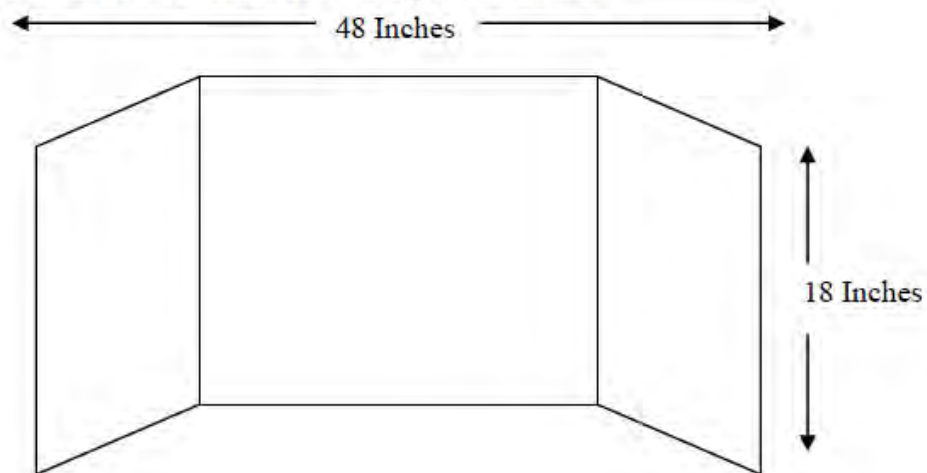
H. General Policies

- Enter at your own risk.
- While we handle exhibits with care, some risk of damage exists.
- Displayed to the best of our ability. Items will be displayed as effectively as possible. After judging, pictures may be taken of perishable exhibits and displayed for public viewing rather than the actual item. Perishable exhibits such as indoor plants may be released back to the exhibitor after judging with superintendent or 4-H agent permission.
- Display cases will not be opened to reposition items unless they are upside down or mislabeled.

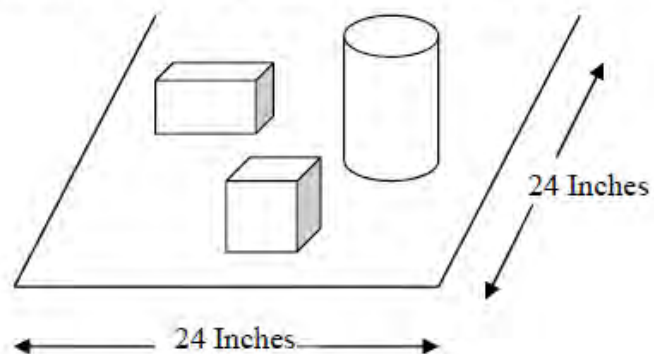
Posters – flat displays appropriate for hanging on the wall.

B. CLASSES

14. No classes will be made other than those listed in the Fair Book. When making an entry, check to see if there is a class listed for that particular exhibit. Incorrect entries will be rejected and returned to members for necessary corrections.
15. Members will be allowed to enter multiple exhibits in each class in Youth Hall. County only classes are designated by starting with a “c-”. Items entered in County Only classes are not eligible to move onto State Fair. Only the first-place item from each age division in numbered classes will move onto the State Fair.
16. All awards and placings of contests/shows by judges will be considered final and shall not be subject to change, except by the judge him/herself. If you have a disagreement, you must follow the steps below to file a formal complaint.
 - **Procedural Protest:** In an instance where a judge’s score/placing are tabulated by a third party and an error is believed to be found, the issue must be presented to the Department Superintendent or 4-H Fair Board Member **within** 2 hours following the presentation of the award. If an error is corroborated by the show official, the award shall be returned and presented to the rightful recipient.
 - **Formal Protests:** If after talking to the Department Superintendent and/or County Extension Agent/s, the complaining party is not satisfied, a formal protest may be filed.
 - **Protest Process:** All formal protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of **\$50.00 per name** on the complaint, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and **must be delivered to the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair Board President immediately after the occasion of such protest.** Protest in all animal species **must be filed by the close of judging.** All other protests must be filed no later than **1PM the day before the Junior Livestock Sale.**

C. AWARDS

17. **A.** First to sixth place ribbons will be awarded in Youth Hall number only classes. Danish (blue, red, and white) ribbons will be awarded in Youth Hall County only open classes. Cloverbuds and Exploration Age will be awarded participation ribbons. Overall, Champion awards will be given in project sections as designated. No Champion Awards will be given for County Only classes. Awards will not be given unless the exhibits are deemed worthy of merit by a judge.
B. First to sixth place ribbons will be awarded in livestock classes except in horse, rabbit, poultry, dog, and small animal show. For horse, rabbit, poultry, dog, and small animal show, check with department rules.
C. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion ribbons will be presented in livestock classes. **No Grand Champion will be awarded in livestock classes unless there is competition.**
18. Special Awards will be given in project groupings in Youth Hall. There will be awards for novices, juniors and seniors.

A. Points will be awarded on the following basis:

Champion.....	10 points
Reserve Champion.....	9 points
First Place.....	7 points
Blue Award (Danish).....	6 points
Second Place.....	6 points
Third Place.....	5 points
Red Award (Danish).....	4 points
Fourth Place.....	4 points
Fifth Place.....	3 points
White Award (Danish).....	2 points
Sixth Place.....	2 points

B. A minimum of 30 points must be scored per project grouping category for a youth to be eligible for a high point award.

C. Awards will be presented at the discretion of the superintendent and Agent for the respective project.

IMPORTANT: PLEASE READ

If you are new or returning it is important to read through the Youth Hall section of the Fair book. All county classes are listed in a shaded box. This will make it clear to the exhibitor about the award system and which projects qualify for State Fair.

Any project created as a group, with adult help, or in a school setting where the exhibitor is not a registered 4-H member, will be displayed and given participation awards.

Note: Because of security and space limitations, extremely large/heavy project exhibits may not be accepted for display in the 4-H Youth Hall Department; call 243-1386 for prior approval on large Woods, Welding or other large project displays. This only applies to actual items – posters, display boards, and vertical displays may not be oversized. We cannot guarantee that oversized items will be placed behind glass.

Note: The following Sections will apply to all classes throughout this department unless otherwise noted:

Ages are all determined as of January 1st of the current year:

SECTION N – NOVICE (8 years old and in the third grade or 9-11)

SECTION J – JUNIOR (11 years old and in the 6th grade or 12-13)

SECTION S – SENIOR (13 years old and in the 8th grade or 14-19)

HOW TO REGISTER YOUR PROJECTS

Go to FairEntry.com and find Bernalillo County 4-H Fair

Look up the department your projects fall under. (Check the Index)

Example: Exhibit about digestive system of a horse (Poster)

Record Book for the above project

These projects fall under the Horse Project. The poster project is listed in the Fair book like this:

Class # 17 NM 4-H Horse Project

A class with just a number is eligible for State Fair and you must be enrolled in the project to be eligible to compete in the class.

*The project book falls under **PROJECT BOOKS**. Go down the list to find horse project, which is listed in the Fair book as this:*

46-C County-only—Any Animal Science exhibit that doesn't fit in the above categories

*A class with a “C” is a county class. It is **NOT** eligible for State Fair or Champion Awards and is awarded under Danish Award System.*

Class numbers will guide you in fair entry. The project numbers help you reference which project book to look in for item specifications and requirements.

All food items should be placed on a disposable plate, platter, etc. and covered in clear plastic wrap.

Special Exhibits

A special exhibit category will be provided in Youth Hall to display projects that may be completed as a group or with significant help from an adult. The purpose of the category is to provide a positive showing experience for all age youth that may be involved in 4-H in a less traditional manner such as through the military family's partnership, 4-H in schools program, etc. This category is participation only, and projects will not move on to state fair.

SPEECH CONTEST

Agricultural Public Speaking Contest Exhibition

Contest Date and Time: To Be Announced by Fair Board

Entry Fee: \$1

Eligibility: This contest is open to all registered Bernalillo County 4-Hers (Cloverbud, Novice, Junior, Senior). Registration in a specific project in Z Suites is not required. As this is an exhibition, entries will be allowed up to 5 minutes prior to the contest beginning.

Entry Limitation: Contestants are limited to one (1) individual entry. An entry must be the result of a participant's own effort and ability. Team entries are NOT allowed.

Judging Criteria: Judging is similar to the criteria set forth in the National FFA Organization and the New Mexico State 4-H Prepared Public Speaking criteria.

Documentation: Each contestant (Novice, Junior, Senior) must submit the following items by the entry deadline to be eligible for competition:

- i. Abstract
 - a. The abstract will consist of 200-300 words.
- ii. List of references in APA format
 - a. A minimum of five references must be used and cited.
 - b. A list of citation guides is available at <https://nmsu.libguides.com/citingyoursources/APA>.
- iii. If the contestant does not follow the guidelines outlined above, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Contest Superintendent, Contest Committee, Show Management, or Judges.

Contest Format: Contestants will randomly draw to determine the speaking order.

Dress Attire: Contestants should wear presentable attire. Business attire or Official 4-H or FFA attire is recommended.

Time: Each speech shall be timed.

- i. Novice and Junior divisions: Speeches must be between 3 minutes and 7 minutes.
- ii. Senior division: Speeches must be between 6 and 8 minutes
- iii. Time point deductions will apply as follows:
 - a. Under the minimum - one point per second.
 - b. Novices will not receive point deductions for speeches below the minimum, as long as their speech is longer than one minute.
 - c. Over the maximum - one point per second.
 - d. No time warnings will be given.

Question/Answer Period: Up to 3 minutes of a question-and-answer period will follow each speech. At the end of 3 minutes, time will be called, and all questioning will end. If time is called during the participant's answer to the last question, the contestant may complete his or her answer. The public is NOT allowed to ask questions or comment during the judging.

Props: The use of pets, signs, electronics, objects, or props of any kind are prohibited. A violation of this rule will result in contestant disqualification.

Presentation Schedule Conflict: Participants with conflicts due to participation in other fair events held on the same day of the contest will need to notify the Contest Superintendent during check-in to arrange a presentation time.

Awards: Ribbons will be awarded.

Topic areas: Contestants will NOT be judged by topic (i.e., animal science). However, participants do need to select a topic.

Speech Topic Areas: Each contestant will enter their speech in one of the topic areas listed below.

Topic Areas:

- Sustainable Bioeconomy: Studies related to production of renewable biological resources and the use of normally wasted byproducts as value-added products.
- New Mexico Agricultural Heritage: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as New Mexico agricultural history and/or culture.
- Agri-Science Technology: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as biotechnology, biogenetics, bioengineering, mechanical engineering, new Agri Technology applications, global positioning and other satellite technology, computer applications, or other agricultural innovations.

- Agricultural Advocacy/Leadership or Communication: A subject that either advocates for agriculture, discusses methods of advocacy or how to communicate agricultural information to the public, or leadership in agriculture.
- Agribusiness or Agri-marketing: Any current and future subject that deals with topics such as cooperatives, sales, service, entrepreneurship, marketing, finance, commodities, hedging, advertising, etc.
- Plant or Animal Science: Any current or future subject that deals with any aspect(s) of livestock or specialty animal industries, animal science issues, New Mexico crops, agronomic sciences, or horticulture.
- Rural Economic Development: Any current or future subject that deals with growing the rural economy of New Mexico or improving the livelihood of rural people and rural communities.
- Environment and Natural Resources: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as soil, water, air, water quality, wildlife, forestry, aquaculture, conservation, recreation, recycling, energy, or other environmental issues.
- Agricultural Policy: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as domestic farm issues or policies, legal issues, international trade, international competition, agricultural aid, or global food and fiber needs.

Eligibility of Previous Winners: Winners of the Agricultural Public Speaking at the Bernalillo County Fair are eligible to compete again the next year. Previous First (1st) and Second (2nd) Place winners in all Divisions, at either Bernalillo County Fair, NMSF, SNMSF, or ENMSF must select a new speech topic to remain eligible to enter the contest in subsequent year(s).

Resources: Participants are encouraged to use their Extension Agents, FFA Teachers, agricultural and natural resources professionals and New Mexico State University faculty as resources. All work and research must be the participant's own, but they are encouraged to network and learn from people working in the topic area related to their topic.

Cloverbuds: Cloverbud division will be participation-only. Speeches will have no minimum time and a maximum time limit of 3 minutes. Team speeches will be allowed as long as the maximum time (3 minutes) is not exceeded. Props and notes are allowed but no special equipment will be provided by the contest organizers (i.e. a projector). An abstract or references are not required. Any agricultural-related topic is allowed.

Youth Hall food products may be selected for a silent auction to be held during the Market Sale.

Rules:

1. Members must be enrolled in the specific project by May 1 to participate.
2. Food items selected for the silent auction will be determined by the Youth Hall judges. Eligible items include self-determined baked goods, food preservation projects, etc. County-only food projects are not eligible.
3. The 1st item must have been judged during the current year of Youth Hall judging.
4. A 2nd item must be provided on the day of the Market Sale. If not provided, the member will forfeit their spot. No IOU's accepted.
5. These items will NOT count towards the limit of sale items in the Market Sale.
6. No containers will be returned.
7. At least 6 servings of individual baked items must be provided the day of the sale (ex. muffins, cookies, etc.). A whole baked item must be provided (full-size bread loaf, cake, pie, etc.) for a multi-serving baked good. Food preservation projects must be the size specified in the project.
8. Any changes to these rules will be published in the county newsletter prior to the county fair.
9. Bernalillo County Fair Board reserves the right to collect a 5% processing fee to cover Youth Hall expenses.

ANIMAL DEPARTMENTS

ANIMAL SALE

FRIDAY, Aug 01, 5:00 PM

Auction Liaisons: Vinita Pedroncelli & Terri Powell

General Sale Policies:

- Each exhibitor will be limited to a total of two items in the sale. Breeding and dairy animals are not eligible for sale.
- The 4-H member has the option to not sell. A 4-H member choosing to remove their animal from auction consideration must do so by **6pm Wednesday** evening following the market animal show. The 4-H member will be required to sign an Auction Withdrawal Form that is binding and the animal withdrawn from the auction will not be reconsidered at any time after the signed withdrawal form is provided to an Animal Auction Liaison.
- Sale ring pie and cake will be sold as one item and count as one item for the exhibitor.
- 4-H members participating in the sale **MUST** attend the Mandatory Sale Meeting. Roll will be called from the sale order. A penalty of twenty (\$20) dollars will be assessed against any exhibitor's absence who has not notified the committee prior to the meeting. Exhibitors are responsible for transporting their sale animals to the holding pens prior to the sale. Failure to transport your animal to the holding pen prior to the sale will result in disqualification from the sale.
- All items must be shown by the owner in the sale ring unless prior approval is obtained.
- Any animal that has been through a premium sale will not be eligible to sell.
- All sales are final, and animals sold are the property of the buyer. The auction participant and/or his/her parent **MAY NOT** and **WILL NOT** approach a buyer to retain the animal after auction. Any 4-H member and/or parent approaching a buyer who has purchased his/her animal with the intent to keep the animal that was sold through the auction will **FORFEIT** ALL auction proceeds.
- Should an animal which has been sold die, before it is loaded on the truck or delivered to the buyer, all sale monies will be refunded to the buyer and the exhibitor will suffer the loss.
- All proceeds from the sale will be paid to the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair Board. Buyers will be billed by the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair Board. A cashier will be available for buyers who wish to make a payment at the sale.
- Any exhibitor or member of the exhibitor's family, having an animal or animals in the sale are prohibited from seeking special privileges from buyers, such as asking permission to repurchase the animal from the buyer or packer to be shown again or to be used for any other

purpose. The seeking of such privileges will subject the exhibitor to disciplinary action as deemed necessary by the 4-H Fair Board and County 4-H Agents, including forfeiture of sale proceeds, being barred from future participation until such a time as reinstatement is made by the 4-H Board.

- No animal will be spray painted prior to the sale or messages written on the animal in any other form.
- There will be a seven (7) percent assessment of all sale proceeds. The seven percent assessment will go to help pay for Fair expenses.
- Exhibitors will wear appropriate and 4-H approved attire in the sale ring. No T-shirts, Tank Tops, or Shorts will be worn in the sale ring.

Small Animal:

Small animals will qualify for auction based upon the highest placings first (Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Division/Class champions, followed by remaining 1st through 6th placings). The number of animals eligible for sale/auction will be based upon a percentage of the total entries and shall not exceed: 29 poultry, 7 rabbits; 3 cavy. If the allotted slots are not filled by one species, slots will not be filled with another species. Disqualified animals and breeding animals are not eligible for sale and will not be considered in the total entries.

The number of sale slots may vary dependent upon the number of entries and will be determined at the discretion of the Sale Committee members. Sale order will be posted prior to the mandatory sale meeting.

1. Grand and Reserve Champions (if awarded) from each Lot (except Division 5: Domesticated Game Birds and other poultry) will be eligible for auction. All remaining sale slots will be determined based on placings with the highest ranked placings first. Disqualified animals will not be eligible for sale.
2. A 4-H exhibitor who has multiple animals or items (pie or cake) that qualify for auction will have their eligible items/animals ranked and the highest placings will be eligible and offered first for auction slots. If the exhibitor “pulls” their animal or item from the offered auction slot, no guarantee is provided or implied that they will be offered another slot.
3. The 4-H seller is responsible for arranging to deliver or provide a box/carrier for the buyer to carry the animal home from the auction. If the buyer's preference is to receive the animal after auction, the seller is responsible to coordinate delivery of the animal to the buyer at an agreed date/time and notify the superintendent of the delivery. The animal sold at auction must be delivered to the buyer before sale proceeds are released to the 4-H member.
4. Any animal previously sold through the Bernalillo County 4-H Animal auction is not eligible for auction again.

Large Animal:

Market animals will qualify for auction based upon the highest placings first (Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Division/Class Champions, followed by remaining 1st through 6th placings). The number of animals eligible for sale/auction will be based upon a percentage of the total market animal entries and shall not exceed: 10 market beef; 12 swine; 12 lambs; and 12 goats. If the allotted slots are not filled by one species, slots will not be filled with another species. Sifted animals and breeding/dairy animals are not eligible for sale and will not be considered in the total entries.

All qualifying slots and sale order will be determined by Sale Committee members but based upon placings and ordered from heavy weight to light weight in qualifying market classes and as ordered by the Fair Book where applicable. The number of sale slots may vary dependent upon the number of entries and will be determined at the discretion of the Sale Committee members.

The sale order will be posted prior to the mandatory sale meeting.

Sale Ring Cake & Pie:

ENTRIES DUE JULY 02, 2025, in Fair Entry

1st CAKE/PIE DROP OFF– FRIDAY, JULY 25th, Manuel Lujan C

Open to Novice, Junior, and Senior Members

C-1x - Whole cake made from scratch that does not require refrigeration.

C-2x - Whole pie made from scratch that does not require refrigeration.

The following food safety guidelines must be followed:

1. Frostings or fillings must be at least 65% sugar by weight to be considered food safe at room temperature. (See example)
2. No raw eggs or raw flour in uncooked frostings or fillings. Commercial meringue powder may be used in place of raw egg whites for frosting.
3. No cream cheese frosting or filling (unless calculation is provided proving the recipe is at least 65% sugar).
4. No chocolate ganache, heavy cream frosting, or lemon curd.
5. No fresh fruit or vegetables as garnishes.
6. No custard pie (ex. pumpkin pie), cream pie, or chiffon pie.
7. No fresh (unbaked) fruit pie/cake (ex: fresh strawberry pie).
8. Fruit may be cooked into a product (ex. pineapple upside down cake).
9. No dairy-based filling (ex. sour cream, cream cheese, ricotta).

10. Dairy products baked into the entire batter (not as a separate filling) are allowed.
11. No alcohol may be used in preparation.
12. Food containers will not be returned.

Members eligible to bake a cake/pie for sale through Market Sale must:

1. Bake cake/pie of choice and enter one whole cake/pie and report portfolio.
2. The following items must be entered in a report portfolio.
 - a. A cover page including photo of the cake/pie, exhibitor's name, name of recipe and county.
 - b. The recipe & sugar calculation if applicable
3. 4-H Story
 - a. Not to exceed 2 double spaced pages
 - b. Margins are to be no smaller than 1 inch.
 - c. Font size of at least 12 for readability
 - d. White paper with blue or black ink
 - e. Details to include in the story:
 - i. Goals for foods project taken.
 - ii. How pie/cake recipe was chosen
 - iii. Description of past involvement in 4-H foods projects and activities
 - iv. How foods knowledge learned in 4-H will be used in the future
 - v. Any other information exhibitor would like to share with the judges.
 - vi. This is a professional report, not a scrapbook. Do not add additional photos.
4. Winning recipes cannot be repeated in 4-H competition for five years. The previous year's winner cannot enter the same category for one year following.

 - ii. Olivia Marsalis—Country Cherry Pie
5. The winner must be prepared to provide a second cake/pie for the actual sale. The 4-Her is responsible for finding their own bidders for the auction. If the Market Sale is divided into 2 separate sales, the Sale Ring Cake will sell in the Livestock Sale and the Sale Ring Pie will sell in the Small Animal Sale.

6. The agent responsible for Youth Hall must be notified of Sale Ring Cake/Pie withdrawal prior to 5:00pm on Wednesday before the sale.
7. If a 4-Her has two eligible animals in the sale, only two entries can be sold (i.e. 1 cake and 1 animal or 2 animals). If the winner declines to sell the cake/pie, the second place Sale Ring cake/pie winner will be eligible for the sale.
8. The entries will be judged 70% on the food taste & appearance, 30% on the story.

If an entrant has a question about the suitability, food safety, or repetition of the planned recipe, the Youth Hall 4-H agent and/or Youth Hall Superintendent(s) should be contacted prior to Youth Hall judging day. Any amendments to these rules will be published in the county 4-H newsletter prior to the county fair.

Example 1: Simple Buttercream Frosting

Ingredients (weight in grams)

2 cups unsalted butter (454g)

8 cups powdered sugar (960g)

½ teaspoon salt (3g)

¼ cup heavy cream (59g)

2 teaspoons vanilla extract (8g)

Total Weight 1430g

% sugar: $(960/1430) \times 100 = 67.1 \%$

This frosting is more than 65% sugar and considered stable at room temperature.

SMALL ANIMAL SHOWS

POULTRY, RABBIT, CAVY, ALL OTHER SMALL
ANIMALS

Saturday, July 26, 2025

- Animals will be checked in from 1 PM-5 PM
- All exhibitors must arrive during this designated time. Failure to check-in during this window will result in disqualification from the show. If an exhibitor is unable to check-in during this time due to extenuating circumstances, they must notify the Superintendent at least 24 hours in advance for consideration of an exception. Exceptions are not guaranteed and will be granted at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- Participating 4-H members should check in at the **registration desk**.
- Then, animals will be verified they are registered, and participants will be advised where the cage is located.
- Please set up your animal in their cage with food, water, and wood shavings under the cages. **Shavings may not always be provided.** Bring your own food and water dispensers.
- **Optional** - You may bring decorations to decorate your cages, so it is easier to find your animals.
- 4-H members must care for their own entries twice daily—NO EXCEPTIONS. 4-H members must feed and water between 7-9 AM and between 4-6 PM daily. Failure to care for your animal may disqualify you from awards or auction proceeds. 4-H members are required to clean and replace old shavings with fresh shavings **daily**. It is important to present yourself and your animal in a positive manner because we will have guests and buyers visiting the small animal barn.
- Small animal participants must clean under their cages on Saturday morning before animals will be released.
- Participants must check out with the species superintendent and cages will be inspected prior to leaving the fair on the last day.
- For the showmanship competition, exhibitors must show their own project animal, except for an extenuating circumstance in which a borrowed animal may be shown providing approval of the superintendent, fair board, and 4-H agent.

Small Animal Showmanship and Round Robin Competitions

It will be the responsibility of County 4-H Agent and Fair Board Small Animal Superintendents to coordinate this contest.

- In order to maintain judging integrity and maintain the appearance of fairness, parents of exhibitors are not allowed in the judging area and are not allowed to speak with judges other than accepting feedback. Non-partisan judge helpers will be designated by the species superintendent.
- The Round Robin champion showmanship competition (small animals only, rabbit, poultry, cavy, and dog) will be at the end of all small animal shows.
- Showmanship in each species will consist of combined scores from the knowledge test and the exhibitor's verbal presentation to the judge.
- For Round Robin – 4-H members will be required to show a rabbit, poultry, cavy, and a dog.

SMALL ANIMAL SHOWMANSHIP

Showmanship in each small animal species will consist of combined scores from the knowledge test and the exhibitor's verbal presentation to the judge. See the Dog Show section of the book for specific information about dog showmanship. The following rules will apply:

- Exhibitors will compete within their age group: Novice, Junior, and Senior. A non-competitive Exploration Age class will be held as well.
- All exhibitors should present themselves as professionals by wearing the appropriate showmanship clothes for their species. Each exhibitor should be clean, hair combed, and it is suggested that they wear clean pants or a skirt and a collared shirt.
- Each exhibitor will take a knowledge test on their species. The superintendent will announce when the test will occur. Those with a need for test accommodations should speak with the 4-H agent in charge prior to the show. Tests will be scored and shall count as 50% of their showmanship score within their age group.
- Each exhibitor will do a verbal presentation to the judge with their animal in accordance with standard practices within that species. The exhibitor will be scored on their ability to show his or her animal to their advantage, general species knowledge, and handling of the animal. This score shall count as 50% of their showmanship score within their age group.
- No exhibitors will be allowed to show a borrowed animal that has not been their designated project animal. If extenuating circumstances exist, fair board may consider exceptions on a case-by-case basis.
- The superintendent and 4-H agents will tally and combine the scores from the test and judge's presentation. A champion and reserve champion rosette will then be awarded to the

top scorers in Novice, Junior, and Senior classes in each species, resulting in 6 (six) competitors per species for Round Robin consideration.

- Once the champions are determined for each age group, the highest score of the 6 competitors will be named the overall species champion showman and the 2nd highest score will be named the overall species reserve champion. The overall species champion will move on to the small animal round robin competition.
- If an exhibitor wins overall champion showman in multiple species, the exhibitor will represent the animal where the highest score was achieved. This will leave a species slot to be filled by the exhibitor who achieved the next highest score. Exhibitors are encouraged to remain at the fairgrounds until round robin participants are announced to ensure each participant will be given the opportunity to engage in the pre-competition prep activities.
- In the event of a tie in species showmanship for poultry, rabbit, and cavy, a tie breaker will be conducted to determine the winner. Each exhibitor will be asked a minimum of five questions. Participants will stand on opposite sides of the show ring and answer questions, until one of them cannot answer. The winner is the participant that answers the most questions correctly. Exhibitors will not be allowed to watch or hear their competitors' answers. In the event of a tie for dog showmanship, the judge will determine an additional pattern to be performed, and the exhibitor will be scored.

SMALL ANIMAL ROUND ROBIN - The winning Champion showmen of each species will compete by showing each other's animals. Example: Poultry Showman winner will show the Rabbit, Cavy and Dog entries for each age group (novice, junior and senior.) They will be *automatically awarded maximum (100) points for showmanship in their species*. The following rules will apply:

- The highest scoring showman in each species will be awarded species champion and will advance to the small animal round robin competition.
- If an exhibitor wins overall champion showman in multiple species, they will represent the animal where the highest score was achieved. This will leave a species slot to be filled by the exhibitor who achieved the next highest score. Exhibitors are encouraged to remain at the fairgrounds until round robin participants are announced to ensure each participant will be given the opportunity to engage in the pre-competition prep activities.
- Coaching by anyone during competition will result in disqualification.
- Each champion showman of his species will give a courtesy demonstration at the beginning of the contest. Judges may narrate and give pointers.
- Each champion will show the animals selected for round robin and be judged for points. The 4-H member will bring to the round robin competition the animal they used during showmanship judging. If there is a safety concern, the animal best suited for round robin

will be discussed in advance and selected by the 4-H agent and species superintendent. Replacement of unruly animals will be at the discretion of the 4-H agent or the superintendent.

- Qualified judges will judge each species.
- Contestants will be required to demonstrate control and knowledge of each species. The required equipment will be provided to show the animals.
- In the event of a tie in the final round robin scores, questions will be asked in a “sudden death” style to determine the winner. Participants will stand on opposite sides of the show ring and answer questions, until one of them cannot answer. The winner is the participant that answers the most questions correctly.
- Scores will be tabulated and validated by the official scorer, 4-H agent and species superintendent.
- One official handler will assist with the rotations if needed.
- The ring steward will announce movements; introduce contestants, judges, etc.
- Grand Champion Round Robin Showman can win once per species. Once you win round robin with one species, you cannot participate in round robin again with that species
- Round robin winners will be announced during awards night at the fair.

Scoring will be by species with a maximum of 20 points for each of the following:

Ability to properly show animal (20 points maximum)

Does the contestant demonstrate the proper ability to show the animal?

Performance and control of the animal. (20 points maximum)

Does the contestant demonstrate the proper reasonable and customary activities in the control and performance of the animal?

Presentation of animal by showman. (20 points maximum)

Does the showman demonstrate the proper aspects and techniques of presenting the animal for judging?

Alertness and appearance of showman. (20 points maximum)

Does the showman demonstrate the proper appearance and alertness specific to the showmanship of the animal?

Sportsmanship of showman. (20 points maximum)

Does the showman demonstrate the proper sportsmanship in relation to other contestants, the animal, the audience, and the judge?

(100 maximum Points)

DEPARTMENT A – POULTRY

Superintendent- Heather Hinde

Rules and Regulations:

The Bernalillo County 4-H Fair recognizes the American Poultry Association, Inc. and will hold its poultry show under the rules of the association. The Judge will be provided with rules of the association by the Superintendent seven (7) days before check-in. Prizes will be awarded in accordance with the APA and ABA Standards of Perfection.

1. Poultry - (Large Breeds, Bantams, Waterfowl, and Turkeys) must be owned as of June 1st of the current year (with exception of Poultry meat pens).
2. Poultry **cannot** be entered in more than one class. Each exhibitor is limited to 6 animals per breed. (*i.e. an exhibitor could bring 6 Wyandotte and 6 Plymouth Rocks, etc...*)
3. No diseased animals will be admitted to the show room for any reason. Any animals arriving sick will be isolated from the other animals until the owner can remove the animal from the fairgrounds. Birds will be inspected daily, and any birds showing signs of illness will be removed and placed in quarantine.
4. All eggs will become property of the fair upon entry and may be auctioned off at the discretion of the Superintendent during the Bake Sale. Money raised will be used to fund Poultry Barn expenses.
5. Where the number of entries is justified, classes may be added by the poultry superintendent.
6. All exhibitors must care for their own entries twice daily – **NO EXCEPTIONS**. 4-H members must feed and water between 7-9 AM and again between 4-6 PM daily. Exhibitors are required to furnish the water and feed containers. Failure to care for your animals may disqualify you from awards and auction proceeds. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their cages and surrounding areas. Clean and replace shavings under cages daily and as needed. It is required to clean the day of the auction.
7. The terms Cock, Hen, Cockerel, Pullet, Old Pen and Young Pen are defined as follows: Cock, a male bird hatched prior to January 1 of the current year; Hen, a female bird hatched prior to January 1 of the current year; Cockerel, a male bird hatched during the year current year; Pullet, a female bird hatched during the current year; Old Pen, one cock and two hens. Young Pen, one cockerel and two pullets. All birds in pen must be the same variety. An old Duck, Drake, Goose, Gander and Tom are defined as those hatched before January 1 of the prior year. A young Duck, Drake, Goose, Gander and Tom are those hatched after January 1 of the current year.
8. Breeding trios consists of three matched birds, one male and two females of the same variety. These can be shown as young or old pens only, a mixed pen of young and old will be excluded. Birds entered as a breeding pen cannot compete in single bird classification. Turkeys, geese and ducks are excluded and not included in the breeding trio competition.

9. Market pens are identical birds, same sex, breed and variety.
10. The production hen and egg project will be a laying hen and 6 of her eggs, which will be judged as a set.
11. Exhibitors must be present during judging unless the superintendents grant an exception before the show starts. If an exhibitor has more than one animal of the same breed, the exhibitor can request assistance from others for confirmation judging.
12. The poultry building is equipped throughout with uniform standard size cages and the superintendent may reserve the right to place more than one female of the same breed and variety belonging to the same exhibitor in one cage.
13. The entries will be made by lot number, variety, breed, and class. Standard breeds of poultry and bantams will be recognized by American Poultry Association (APA) and American Bantam Association (ABA) standards. Pigeons will be recognized by pigeon standards.
14. Cross breed poultry are welcome at fair and judged, and used for showmanship, however they are not eligible for auction. A cross-breed animal may not be as competitive. It is recommended exhibitors know the standards of perfection standards closest to their dominate traits.
15. All game birds must be marked with State Game Bird permit numbers on the cage.
16. If an exhibitor is unable to check out during the designated check out time due to extenuating circumstances, they must notify the Superintendent for consideration of an exception. Exceptions are not guaranteed and will be granted at the discretion of the Superintendent.
17. During the designated check out time, cages and areas under the cages must be cleaned and approved by a small animal committee member.
18. Ribbons will be given for first through sixth place.

CHICKENS

Any breed or variety recognized by the American Bantam Association and the American Poultry Association is eligible to be shown even if that class is not listed below.

These can be shown as young or old pens only, a mixed pen of young and old will be excluded. Birds entered as a breeding pen cannot compete in single bird classification. Turkeys, geese, and ducks are excluded.

Classes will be provided for old cocks, old hens, young cocks, and young hens. Birds will be entered singly.

DIVISION 7: EGG PRODUCTION POULTRY

1. Egg production birds must be entered as such. (You may show any production laying poultry).
2. Egg production birds must be female, as the males do not lay eggs.
3. Cross breeds are welcome in this category.
4. All production hens and pullets must be entered into the show with **half dozen (6) eggs that have been laid by that specific bird** by the time the bird is entered into the fair. These eggs **do not** get entered Division Eggs. (Failure to bring the eggs or the proper eggs laid by the specific animal will result in the animal not being admitted into the show).
5. When you enter for this category simply tell us Production bantam or large fowl as well as production hen or pullet.
6. Any eggs that are laid by healthy, non-medicated hens during the time at fair can be collected and may be auctioned off at the discretion of the exhibitor, taken home, or disposed of. Money generated will be used to fund Poultry Barn expenses.
7. At their discretion, the Superintendent has the right to observe the egg production hens of each exhibitor.
8. All eggs will be judged on interior and exterior quality. The judge reserves the right to break eggs, if it is deemed advisable, in order to properly judge the exhibit.

DIVISION 8: CROSSBREED POULTRY

- Breeds not recognized by APA. They will be judged but will not qualify for sale.

****The winner of Division 6 and Division 7 will compete for Grand Champion of Market Poultry***

POULTRY SHOWMANSHIP

Please refer to the Small Animal Showmanship and Round Robin Competition section (p. 74) for detailed rules and information.

EXPLORATION AGE (Ages: 5-8) POULTRY

There will be one class for all 5–8-year-olds to enter poultry and it will be the first class of the Poultry Show. They may show their own fowl or use a borrowed animal with the owner's permission to enter the show.

DEPARTMENT B – RABBITS & CAVY

Superintendent - (Rabbits and Cavy) Molly Hayes

Rules and Regulations:

1. Rabbits MUST BE OWNED by June 1 of the current year and must be at least 3 months old to show at the fair except meat pens with specified ages.
2. All rabbits must be permanently earmarked in the left ear before judging starts.
3. Rabbits must be immunized for Rabbit Hemorrhagic disease (RHDV) or the 4-H parent must sign a waiver of risk liability.
4. Positively no diseased animals will be admitted in the fair, any animals showing signs of disease will be removed from the fair.
5. Pedigreed rabbits may be entered in more than one class.
6. Pedigreed rabbits shall be shown in Purebred classes only, including Fur and Meat.
Crossbred Rabbits may be shown in Crossbred classes only.
7. Where the number of entries is justified, classes may be added by the rabbit superintendent.
8. Conformation show guidelines will be from the ARBA Standards of Perfection Guidebook
9. Awards will be first to sixth place.
10. Any animal entered including Meat Pen MUST be entered in its respective Breeding class.
11. All exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering rabbit and cavy entries, including furnishing the water & feed dishes. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their cages and surrounding areas.
12. If entries warrant, there will be an Exploration age, Novice, Junior and Senior divisions of Showmanship. Ages for these divisions will follow standard 4-H guidelines. Please refer to the Small Animal Showmanship and Round Robin Competition section (p. 74) for detailed rules and information.
13. All rabbits and cavy must be shown and carried to the table by their owners in both the judging area and the sale ring. Failure to show your animal at the prescribed time or arrange with the superintendent for a substitute will result in disqualification from that class.

No exceptions will be made except as follows:

- a. The 4-H'er has prior knowledge that they cannot participate in the fair. The Superintendent must be made aware of the conflict and approve the exception.
- b. A conflict in scheduling with other 4-H events or an emergency (illness, family death, etc.)
- c. The owner has 2 or more animals in the same class.

In any case, arrangements must be made with the superintendents and/or adult supervisor for a substitute. The substitute must be a Bernalillo County 4-H member.

- d. The owner has a disability preventing conventional means, then adaptations will be developed between parent, exhibitor, show superintendent and extension staff, to enable owner to participate at their fullest capability, without penalty, in the show. No separate class will be made.
- 14. In order to remove your animal, a check-out slip must be obtained from the superintendent.
- 15. Youth desiring to exhibit rabbit pelts or rabbit fur will be encouraged to enter as a self-determined rabbit exhibit or animal science exhibit in Youth Hall.

REGULATIONS AND GUIDELINES:

AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB GUIDELINES:

- All rules and guidelines related to the Bernalillo County 4-H Dog Show not specifically covered in this document will defer to the most current “Rules & Regulations” Books of the American Kennel Club (AKC). These handbooks are available online at WWW.akc.org. Showmanship, Obedience & Rally-O exercises are to be performed according to AKC rules as modified by 4-H. See appropriate 4-H rules below.
- The judge’s decision is final! You may ask the judge about their decision, at their discretion, after the class.

4-H MEMBERS DRESS AND DOG EQUIPMENT GUIDELINES:

1. All attire must meet the current guidelines as outlined in the New Mexico State 4-H clothing Guidelines. Refer to: <http://nm4h.nmsu.edu> Forms & publications Event forms.
2. Attire Guidelines for Showmanship, Obedience, Rally-O with those event rules and guidelines!
3. Equipment for the dogs is with the event (showmanship, obedience, Rally-o) rules and guidelines!

Eligibility

1. To participate in the Bernalillo County 4-H Dog Show the dog must be 6 months old as of January 1st of the current year. To compete in Obedience, Rally-o and Showmanship the dog must be 6 months old as of January 1st of the current year.

Any dog: mix or pure breed, is eligible if it is clearly a 4-H project dog, trained and handled by the 4H exhibitor, and it is not a danger to itself, youth, any other dog or person.

ENTRIES & VACCINATIONS:

1. All entries must be made on the official Bernalillo County 4-H Fair Entry web site.
 - Dog’s vaccination records must be sent to the Bernalillo County 4-H office 2 weeks before Fair date to be verified by Dog Superintendent.

Dog's immunization records must include proof of rabies vaccination signed by a licensed veterinarian and proof of other required vaccinations: distemper, hepatitis, par influenza, signed by a licensed veterinarian or a receipt of vaccines purchased.

ASSISTANCE:

1. 4-H Exhibitor must be able to handle dog without assistance in the show ring.
2. While on the show grounds, no one other than the 4-H exhibitor may train, work, or groom his/her dog. Violation of this rule will result in disqualification.
3. Double-Handling will not be allowed. Double-handling is when someone outside the show ring assists or trains the 4-H exhibitor and/or their dog, while they are inside the show ring, with verbal, hand, or other commands. Violation of the rule will result in disqualification.
4. A 4-H handler with two or more dogs may ask for assistance in holding or leading the second dog, between classes or to and from class or crate.
5. Exceptions to the above rules must be approved by the Bernalillo County Fair Board Committee and be in writing before the Dog Show.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS:

1. Dogs must be on a leash or otherwise confined (crate) at all times, except when in the ring.
2. The 4-H Exhibitor is responsible for checking in with the Ring Steward at the start of the show and each class.
3. Each Exhibitor/Owner/Handler is liable and responsible for his/her dog's behavior. Any dog that attempts to attack any person or another dog may be disqualified and excluded from participation and must be removed from the show arena grounds immediately. At the discretion of the County 4-H Agent or the State 4-H Office a dog may be removed from the 4-H Dog Project.
4. Each Exhibitor/Handler is responsible for picking up after his/her dog. There may be bags and/or pooper scooper provided for clean-up.
5. Exhibitors will be held responsible for keeping premises clean.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their dogs under control.
7. A female dog that is in season will not be allowed to compete and must be removed from the show grounds immediately. The committee will consider this information for a refund of entry fees.
8. Any abuse to dogs on the grounds or in the ring, in the judgment of the show committee, instructor or judge will result in disqualification.
9. Any dog with a contagious, communicable, or infectious disease or condition, in the judgment of the show committee, judge or attending veterinarian, cannot be shown. It must be removed from the show grounds immediately.
10. The Judge has the right and responsibility to excuse any dog he/she considers lame or at risk when participating in an event.

11. Good Sportsmanship shall be observed at all times. The Judge's and/or Bernalillo County Fair Board Committee decision is final. Poor Sportsmanship may lead to loss of ribbon/award, class dismissal or disqualification for the show as determined by the Judge and Show Committee. Any protest should be made in writing to the show committee.

“MOVE-UP” RULES

1. When a dog has received two qualified scores in a class (i.e. Pre-Novice B Obedience) at the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair, they will need to move up to the next level class (i.e. Novice Obedience). Starting with the 2024 Bernalillo County 4-H Dog Show.
2. The 4-H Exhibitor will receive a letter or certificate, notifying them that their dog needs to be moved up to the next level class and what that class is.
3. A dog may stay in the same level class (i.e. Pre-Novice B Obedience), but that dog will not receive points in that class. This is also known as FEO (For Exhibition Only)
4. An exhibitor may move their dog ahead a level without qualifying (i.e. move up from Pre-Novice B Obedience to Pre-Open Obedience – skipping over Novice Obedience) However, once the dog has been moved forward, they CANNOT move BACK.

SHOWMANSHIP

In Showmanship, judges have individual opinions that may vary, but staying close to the standards is recommended. (For the American Kennel Club's Jr. Handler guidelines order the Jr. Handler Regulations Book at www.akc.org CLASSES: The showmanship class is divided into three divisions; Novice, Junior, and Senior “SHOWMANSHIP”.

You must complete in Obedience and Rally-O to compete in Showmanship.

In this class the exhibitor is judged on how well the dog is shown to the judge using the techniques of confirmation showing, grooming, posing & gaiting. (Confirmation or breed of the dog, itself, is not considered.) The dog is judged on its response to the 4-H member. Condition and grooming are considered a part of showmanship. Age-appropriate patterns will be used (Ex: “L” “Triangle” or “T”)

Showmanship will Count 50%

- Showmanship classes as follows: Exploration Age, Novice, Junior, Senior
- Treats or bait MAY be used in the showmanship ring.
- Dogs will be lined up by size of dog, at the discretion of the judge.
- The classes will be placed at the end of each class, and the judge may talk to the 4-H exhibitors then. First place through sixth place ribbons will be awarded in each age class.

Written Test will Count 50% of your Showmanship score.

1. Each 4-H Member will be given a set of 20 questions.

Showmanship Awards

- The superintendent and 4-H agents will tally and combine the scores from the test and judge's presentation.
- A champion and reserve champion rosette will be awarded to the top scorers in Novice, Junior, and Senior classes.
- Once the champions are determined for each age group, the highest score of the 6 competitors will be named the overall species champion showman and the 2nd highest score will be named the overall species reserve champion. The overall species champion will move on to the small animal round robin competition.
- If an exhibitor wins overall champion showman in multiple species, they will represent the animal where the highest score was achieved. This will leave a species slot to be filled by the exhibitor who achieved the next highest score. Exhibitors are encouraged to remain at the fairgrounds until round robin participants are announced to ensure each participant will be given the opportunity to engage in the pre-competition prep activities.
- In the event of a tie for dog showmanship, the judge will determine an additional pattern to be performed, and the exhibitor will be scored.

Obedience Regulations:

(Refer to the American Kennel Club's Obedience Regulations – www.akc.org or call (919) 233-9767 to order rules books)

AKC refers to the rules for obedience as "regulations.". No dog that has an AKC or UKC title may compete in Sub-Novice classes. Chapter 14 – Obedience & Rally Obedience. This also pertains to Rally. Dogs who have earned obedience titles in venues other than 4-H (such as AKC) shall enter the same class level they compete in for the other venue.

Class information

Exploration Age – A mini obedience class will be provided for our exploration age youth members.

Beginner Novice A – This class is for the beginning exhibitor and beginning dog. Neither the exhibitor nor the dog has had any prior obedience experience before October 1 of the current 4-H year. Youth may show only one project dog in Beginner Novice A. Once an exhibitor shows in this

class at the Bernalillo County Fair, he/she must move to Beginner Novice B OR Preferred Novice. Beginner Novice A class can never be repeated by handler OR dog.

Beginner Novice B - Youth may show one project dog in Beginner Novice B OR Preferred Novice, decided upon according to skill level and preference. A youth is NOT permitted to show in both Beginner Novice B and Preferred Novice in the same year. A dog is NOT permitted to be shown in both Beginner Novice B and Preferred Novice in the same year. This class can be repeated with same dog until the dog has scored a 170 or above twice at the Bernalillo County Fair including the Beginner Novice A class. Once the 170 or above has been accomplished the dog MUST move to Preferred Novice or Novice.

Preferred Novice - Youth may show one project dog in Preferred Novice. This class can be repeated with same dog until the dog has scored a 170 or above twice at the Bernalillo County Fair. Once the 170 or above has been accomplished the dog MUST move to Novice.

Novice A - Youth may show one project dog in Preferred Novice. This class can be repeated with same dog until the dog has scored a 170 or above twice at the Bernalillo County Fair. Once the 170 or above has been accomplished the dog MUST move to Graduate Novice.

Graduate Novice A - Youth may show one project dog in Preferred Novice. This class can be repeated with same dog until the dog has scored a 170 or above twice at the Bernalillo County Fair. Once the 170 or above has been accomplished the dog MUST move to Open.

Ties: Tiebreakers will be the judge's decision. Judges will be asked which exercise will serve as a tie breaker before the show begins.

Obedience Awards

Awards will be given for each class Grand Champion and Reserve Champion. Awards decided by the Fair Board Committee. First place through sixth place ribbons will be

awarded in each class to the dogs with the qualified scores. A "Qualified Run" ribbon will be given to who qualify in their class, 170 pts is a qualifying run.

Rally-O Regulations:

(Refer to the American Kennel Club's Rally-O Regulations – www.akc.org or call (919) 233-9767 to order rules books)

RALLY-O CLASSES DESCRIPTION AND DIVISIONS:

EXPLORATION AGE– A mini rally-O class will be set up for our exploration age youth members.

NOVICE RALLY-O: For a first time (beginner) dog who has not scored a 70 or better twice at the Bernalillo County Fair.

1. Dogs will be shown on leash.
2. Minimum allowable score required to qualify = 70. With a score of 70 or better received twice at the Bernalillo County Fair the dog must move up to Advanced Rally-O.
3. There will be 10 – 15 stations, start and finish not included.

ADVANCED RALLY-O: For a dog that has scored a 70 or better, twice at the Bernalillo County Fair in Novice Rally-O.

1. Dogs will be shown off leash.
2. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash.
3. Minimum allowable score required to qualify = 70. With a score of 70 or better received twice at the Bernalillo County Fair, the dog must move up to Excellent Rally-O.
4. There will be 12 – 17 stations, start and finish not included.
5. One jump must be used for this class. It may be any jump used.

Rally-O Awards

Awards will be given for each class Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Awards decided by the Fair Board Committee. First to sixth place ribbons will be awarded in each class to the dogs with the qualified scores.

1. Novice Rally-O
2. Advanced Rally-O

LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS

4-H Staff – Ag and Natural Resource 4-H Agent

DEPARTMENT E – LIVESTOCK – GENERAL

(Also see Department rules)

1. All Market Animals and Horses must meet ownership requirements. Market Steer and Breeding Heifer ownership is by April 15th of the current year. Goats, Swine, Lambs and Dairy Heifer ownership is June 1. A statement of ownership and drug use must also be certified on the fair entry forms. If certificates of ownership are not in the 4-H office by the due date, your livestock will not be ear tagged for the show.

2. Horses shown in the general division which are not owned by the 4-H member must have an affidavit from the owner stating that the 4-H member manages the horse 75% of the time and has full access to the use of the horse.

3. Exhibitors will only be allowed to show six (6) animals of a species (the total number of entries in a species includes both market and breeding) that have been ear tagged. There is not a limit on the number of project animal's ear tagged. All livestock will be inspected for diseases and proper identification at the fair. The schedule for inspection will be provided prior to the Fair. The exhibitors must be prepared to provide proof of ownership if requested. Market Steers, Market Goats and Lambs will not be mouthed, but once it has been shown in the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair, it can **never** be shown again as a market animal in the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair. If an animal is thought to be the same animal shown in a prior year, and if confirmed, will not be ear tagged for the County Fair. Ear tags must be intact at the time of check-in. If an ear tag is lost or missing, notification must be provided to the species Superintendent and Agent prior to check-in so that a new tag can be assigned.

4. a.) Pens will be assigned by the superintendents prior to arrival. If you need special accommodation, please contact the superintendent at least 2 weeks prior to check-in, the superintendent, along with the 4-H Agent, will determine if your needs can be accommodated.

b.) Exhibitors must provide their own feed and take care of their own animals. **PENS AND STALLS MUST BE CLEANED DAILY.** After the livestock sale and before check-out time the pens and stalls must be cleaned. Before leaving the Fairgrounds, the exhibitor must schedule a stall inspection with the Department Superintendent. Failure to do so may result in a disqualification of awards.

5. Animals should not be taken into tack rooms for any reason.

6. Any livestock exhibitor found guilty of any unethical practices, or any practice deemed unethical by the 4-H Fair Board will forfeit all awards and sale money, if any, received by the exhibitor. The animal's owner will be barred from future participation until the 4-H board makes reinstatement.

The following are some examples of unethical practices:

- a. Doctoring, doping, or injecting animals for body "fill-ins" of any type. In accordance with New Mexico Expo previous year Premium book found at <https://statefair.exponm.com/p/participate/competitions/livestock-shows>
- b. The alteration, changing, defacing, or any modification of the markings of the body structure of the animal.
- c. The purpose rendering of harmful or damaging treatment to another exhibitor's livestock.
- d. Removal, alteration, damaging or changing of ear tags.
- e. Force feeding of water or other liquids or the application of water or other liquids to the fleece of a lamb for the purpose of additional weight.
- f. External application of such things as liniments and blistering agents that could cause any change in skin condition.
- g. Force feeding water prior to weigh-in.

7. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care and fitting of his or her animal. The exhibitor's immediate family, legal guardian, 4-H leader, and other 4-H participants may offer instruction and assistance if required. It is preferable that the exhibitor be present. The exhibitor should be present during fitting etc. on show day. No professional fitter may work on any animal in any species.

8. Adults are not allowed to coach exhibitors while in the show ring.

9. No one, except exhibitors and officials (Judge, 4-H agent, independent ring steward, etc..., will be allowed in the show ring while the animals are being judged.

10. All market lambs, market goats, market swine, and market steers will weigh in according to the schedule. The weigh-in is presided over by the Adult Department superintendent with assistance from the other department superintendents, county agent and livestock committee members. All exhibitors must be present for the weigh-in. However, if there is a known conflict, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to advise the species Superintendent and provide a substitute to attend in his/her place. The species Superintendent will classify the animals at the time of weigh-in. At the time of judging, should the judge disagree with the classification of an animal, the animal will be removed from the class and be shown in the other breed classification. Should the judge believe that an animal will not grade or should be removed from the show, their decision will be final.

11. Market animals will be officially weighed and graded at the time of weigh-in. Market swine, market lambs and market goats may be weighed on portable scales if necessary. The Superintendent or designated weigh master reserves the right to check the balance of the scales in borderline cases. In a borderline case, the animal will be removed from the scale and must remain in the weigh-in area while the scale is recalibrated. Once the scale is recalibrated, the animal may be reweighed for a final weight. The weigh-in schedule for livestock is tentative, since the number of animals entered determines the time required to complete the weighing process.

12. Market animals that do not meet weight or grade requirements will be placed in a special (sifted) class and will be judged using the Danish system (blue, red, white awards) and will not be eligible to sell at auction

13. If a 4-H exhibitor is also a member of a FFA chapter in another county that member must choose which county program (Fair) they will show in during the year. If a 4-H exhibitor is also a FFA member they must have their FFA Advisor submit written approval for the individual to show in the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair and not requiring him/her to show in another County Program for a grade. (If the rule is broken the individual will forfeit all sale money)

14. All animals must be shown by their owners in both the judging arena and the sale ring. Failure to show your animal at the prescribed time or arrange with the superintendent for a substitute will result in disqualification from that class.

No exceptions will be made except as follows:

- a. The 4-H'er has prior knowledge that they cannot participate in the fair. The Fair Board must be made aware of the conflict and approve the exception.
- b. A conflict in scheduling or and emergency (illness, family death, etc.) then it must be approved by the superintendent and/or adult advisor.
- c. The owner has 2 or more animals in the same class.
In any case, arrangements must be made with the superintendents and/or adult supervisor for a substitute.
- d. The owner has a disability preventing conventional means, then adaptations will be developed between parent, exhibitor, show superintendent and extension staff, to enable owner to participate at their fullest capability, without penalty, in the show. No separate class will be made.

15. Project animals must be shown by conventional means of other animals in the show. An adult ring steward will be provided in each show ring to assist exhibitors with control of the animals.

16. Judges of the livestock will offer reasons for placing at the time of judging. The decisions of the judge are final and not subject to protest or appeal.

17. Champion and Reserve champion male and female of each breed in Dairy Goat, Dairy Heifer, Breeding Sheep and Breeding Beef and the Champion and Reserve Champion Market Steer, Market

Lamb, Market Goat and Market Swine will be selected if in opinion of the judges they merit this award.

18. Adult handling of livestock will only be permitted for safety reasons or at the department's discretion. Example: Moving steers from tie up to wash racks.

19. Offspring born to 4-H project animals after the ownership dates specified elsewhere in the book are eligible to be shown in the fair providing the animals meet all department requirements.

20. The total number of entries will determine the number of weight divisions as follows (Market classes):

6 and under.....	All Weights
7 through 12.....	Light and Heavy
13 through 18.....	Light, Medium, and Heavy
19 through 24.....	Light, Medium Light, Medium Heavy, and Heavy
25 and over.....	Light, Medium Light, Medium, Medium Heavy, and Heavy

21. All exhibitors must comply with New Mexico Livestock Board Health regulations that have been or may be issued concerning show animals.

22. Animal Welfare: It is the responsibility of all exhibitors to provide proper and humane care and treatment to animals. Fair Officials reserves the right to disqualify and remove any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal.

23. Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on Show grounds, a licensed veterinarian will be contacted. In the event the veterinarian is unable to be present to administer aid, the verbally prescribed medication and/or recommended treatment may be administered by no less than (2) Superintendents or (1) Superintendent and an active Livestock Committee member or approved adult 4-H volunteer, with notification to the agent prior to administration of medication and/or treatment. The licensed veterinarian's recommended prescription or treatment shall also be obtained in writing within 2 business days to validate the actions administered.

24. The animal(s) that is/are administered treatments are eligible to show and sell (if qualified) only with the Superintendent's and veterinarian's recommendations. A superintendent's approval to show/sell will not override the vet's opinion.

25. Animals that are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will not be eligible to go to the processor after auction until such withdrawal period has lapsed. The animal will be the exhibitor's responsibility to be taken home to care for until the withdrawal

time has lapsed. The exhibitor will then be responsible for making arrangements with the buyer to take to the processor.

25. Treatment Cost: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

Any violation of set forth rules can result in disqualification of the offender from the show and/or sale, and the forfeiture of all awards and sale money, if any, received by the exhibitor.

DEPARTMENT E

LIVESTOCK SHOWMANSHIP

All members with animals qualified to show will be judged for showmanship. Four classes of Showmanship will be offered for each species department: Exploration Age (ages 5-8), Novice, Junior & Senior. Animals that don't make weight will be shown in the sifted class so the exhibitor may still show in showmanship if he/she desires.

Pre-entry, for Showmanship, through entry system is preferred for Beef, Swine, Sheep, Dairy Cattle, Goat and Dairy Goat. Consult the department rules for the handling of the showmanship judging. Only members showing their own animals will be eligible to participate in the showmanship contests in each age category.

- At the end of the Showmanship age divisions, a fun showmanship Contest will be conducted for 4-H members who do not own an animal but want to gain experience exhibiting a borrowed animal.
- Champion Showmanship ribbons will be awarded in each species of Livestock.

Showmanship classes will be brought back to the show ring and will be judged by age category. (Novice, Junior, Senior) The Champion Novice, Champion Junior and Champion Senior showmen will return to the ring and compete for the overall Champion Showman of the species. The winner will be eligible to compete in the Round Robin Grand Champion Showmanship contest. The Reserve Champion showman of the age category that won overall Champion Showman will then compete against the remaining participants for the Reserve Champion Showman of the species.

ROUND ROBIN GRAND CHAMPION SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

It will be the responsibility of County Livestock Agent, Fair Board Chair, and Livestock Superintendents to coordinate this contest.

Contest participants will bring the animal that they won with in their species showmanship contest to the Round Robin, unless there is a safety issue. If there is a safety concern, the animal best suited for Round Robin will be discussed and selected by the 4-H agent and species superintendent. The exception will be swine. *Four (4) market hogs will be selected by the superintendent and 4-H agent and the participants may select one of their choosing to show.*

- a. The winning Champion showmen of each species will compete by showing each other's animals. Example: Beef Showman winner will show the Swine entry, etc. They will be

automatically awarded maximum (100) points for showmanship in their species. The following rules will apply:

- b. Coaching by anyone will result in disqualification.
- c. Contestants will enter the ring dressed neatly and appropriately for the species in which they qualified to enter the Round Robin. NO CHANGE of apparel once the contest begins.
- d. Each Champion showman of their species will give a courtesy demonstration at the beginning of the contest. Judges may narrate and give pointers.
- e. Each Champion will show the animals selected for the Round Robin and be judged for points.
- f. Qualified judges will judge each species.
- g. Contestants will be required to walk the different species around the ring and demonstrate control and set the animals up with the exception of the hog. Show sticks, bats, brushes etc. will be furnished with each animal as required to properly show each different species.
- h. Replacement of unruly animals – with the exception of swine, a replacement animal will be available in the event of an unruly animal.
- i. Prior to the contest three species will be designated as the tie breakers.
- j. Scores will be tabulated by an official scorer.
- k. One official handler will assist with the rotations.
- l. The ring steward will announce movements; introduce contestants, judges, etc.
- m. It will be the responsibility of County 4-H Agent, Fair Board Chair, and Livestock Superintendents to coordinate this contest.
- n. Scoring will be by species with a maximum of 20 points for each of the following:
 - 1) Ability to properly show animal (20 points maximum) _____
Does the contestant demonstrate the proper ability to show the animal?
 - 2) Performance and control of the animal. (20 points maximum) _____
Does the contestant demonstrate the proper reasonable and customary activities in the control and performance of the animal?
 - 3) Presentation of animal by showman. (20 points maximum) _____
Does the showman demonstrate the proper aspects and techniques of presenting the animal for judging?
 - 4) Alertness and appearance of showman. (20 points maximum) _____
Does the showman demonstrate the proper appearance and alertness specific to the showmanship of the animal?
 - 5) Sportsmanship of showman. (20 points maximum) _____
Does the showman demonstrate the proper sportsmanship in relation to other contestants, the animal, the audience, and the judge?

(100 maximum Points) _____

- o. After winning Grand Champion Round Robin Showman once in a species in any prior year, that exhibitor must win Champion showman in another species before being eligible to show for Grand Champion Showman in Round Robin again.
- p. A 4-H member may ONLY ENTER WITH ONE SPECIES. If qualified with more than one species, the RESERVE showman will represent that species which the Champion elects not to show. In the event that the Reserve Champion showman of a particular species is competing with a different species, unavailable, or chooses not to compete, the next placing showman in that species will compete as the Champion showman for the contest.

DEPARTMENT F-1

MARKET SWINE

Superintendent – Jessica Batie

All swine must be owned, and records kept from June 1 of the current 4-H year.

Barrows and Gilts may be entered. Boars and Crypt-orchid males will be sifted. Swine that do not grade Number 2 or better will be sifted from the show by the Judge and will not be eligible for sale.

All swine must have ear notches that match the New Mexico Livestock Board Swine Identification certificate(s) turned in. Identification certificates must be turned in at the time of check-in.

All exhibitors and/or representatives must be present for breed classification and weigh in their Swine. Swine will be weighed on the designated scaled provided at Bernalillo County Fair and at the time specified.

Swine weight limits are as follows:

Minimum 190 pounds

Maximum 280 pounds

To allow for any adjustments regarding use of the portable scale, a 10-pound slack weight will be used. Any weight between 180 and 290 pounds will be the actual weight. Any swine above or below the minimum and maximum weights will be placed in the Sifted Class. Sifted animals are not eligible for sale in the Fair Auction.

Breed Classification of all swine will be determined by the Swine Superintendent. Once the breed classification is declared only the Judge can remove an animal from its breed classification. The Show Judge will be instructed that any swine shown in a breed class that do not show correct breed characteristics will be removed to the correct breed class based on his decision.

Breed Classes will be:

LOT – 101 Poland China and Spotted Poland China

LOT – 110 Duroc

LOT – 111 Hereford

LOT – 120 Hampshire

LOT – 130 Chester White

LOT – 140 Yorkshire

LOT – 150 Crosses and all Other Breeds

LOT – 170 Prospect Class

Classes may be divided by breed and/or weight with a minimum of three (3) hogs to constitute a class. If the classes are deemed too small, they may be combined with another breed class at the discretion of the Swine Superintendent.

The First-Place swine in each weight class within a breed will show for Champion of the Breed. Once the Champion is selected, the 2nd place from the weight class that the Champion was selected from will show for Reserve Champion against all other First Place swine in that breed. If only one weight class exists, then the First and Second Place of the breed will be Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed. Once all Champions are selected, they will then show for Grand Champion of the show. After the Grand Champion of the show is selected, the Reserve Champion of the breed that the Grand Champion is selected from will show against all other Champions for Reserve Champion of the show.

After the Breed and Weight Classes have been established and Champions selected, the Sale Committee and Swine Superintendent will split proportionally the number of Swine to be sold within each breed classification.

Swine Showmanship: Showmanship classes will be brought back to the show ring and will be judged by age category. Classes will be in the order: Exploration (ages 5-8), Novice, Junior, Senior, and Fun. Exploration Age participants can/will be accompanied by an older 4-H member for assistance in the ring, as needed. See Department E Livestock Showmanship for more details.

- The Champion Novice, Junior, and Senior will compete to be selected the Champion Swine Showman. The overall Champion Swine Showman will compete in the Grand Champion Round Robin Showmanship contest. If the Champion is not able to compete, then the Reserve Champion Swine Showman will represent the Swine department in the Round Robin contest. If the Reserve Champion is unable to compete, then the next placed competitor as deemed by the judge will compete in the Round Robin contest.
- At the conclusion of the Showmanship age divisions, a Fun Showmanship Contest will be conducted for 4-H Members who do not own an animal but who would like to gain experience. If the exhibitor needs to borrow an animal, they must obtain permission from the owner of that animal in advance of the contest.

DEPARTMENT F-2 & F-3 SHEEP

Superintendent – Jessica Kellam

DEPARTMENT F-2 - MARKET LAMBS

All animals must be ear tagged prior to the Fair as provided for in the General Rules. All Market animals must be 4H tagged and tattooed at/prior to brand inspection/tagging. All breeding animals are required to have a valid scrapie's tag in addition to the 4H tag prior to check-in. *See General rules for more information.*

Lambs/Sheep will be inspected by the superintendent at the Fair Grounds before entering pens. The ear tag of infected animals will be removed and the animal will not be allowed on the Fairgrounds. The policy for identifying and handling infected animals will be directed by the New Mexico Livestock Board.

The same animal cannot be shown in the market class and the breeding class in the same year. Ewes may be shown as either market or breeding but not in the same year. A Ewe shown in the market class as a lamb and retained by the exhibitor may be entered into a breeding class the following year but NOT in a market Mutton class. Intact males may only be entered into a breeding class.

Each class will be judged separately. A minimum of three animals will constitute a breed class. Classes not meeting this requirement will be combined with another breed class at the Department Superintendent's discretion.

Lamb Showmanship: The Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected in Novice, Junior, Senior and Fun levels. *See Department E Livestock Showmanship for more details.*

- The Champion Novice, Junior, and Senior will compete to be selected the Champion Lamb Showman. The overall Champion Lamb Showman will compete in the Grand Champion Round Robin Showmanship contest. If the Champion is not able to compete, then the Reserve Champion Lamb Showman will represent the lamb department in the Round Robin contest. If the Reserve Champion is unable to compete, then the next placed competitor as deemed by the judge will compete in the Round Robin contest.
- At the conclusion of the Showmanship age divisions, a fun showmanship Contest will be conducted for 4-H members who do not own an animal but who would like to gain experience exhibiting a borrowed animal

DEPARTMENT F-2 - MARKET LAMBS

- All market Lambs must be owned, and records kept from June 1 of the current 4-H year.

- Only wether and ewe lambs under a year of age may be exhibited in the market lamb classes with the exception of the mutton class which must be over a year and must not have been shown in previous years as a market.
- All market lambs/sheep must be sheared within one fourth (1/4) of an inch prior to check in.
- The Lambs will be weighed with a portable scale at the time specified in the schedule. To allow for any adjustments in regard to the portable scale, a slack weight will be allowed with a five-pound variance. If a Lamb weighs between 77 and 80 pounds, the weight will be declared as 80 pounds.

Minimum and Maximum weights for Market Sheep are as follows:

- Market Lambs-Min of 80 pounds and the max weight is open.
- Southdown/SD Influence Market Lambs-Min of 70 Pounds and max weight is open.

All Exhibitors or their representative must be present to weigh in their lamb and declare the breed classification. Once the breed classification is declared only the judge can remove an animal from the breed classification on their discretion.

After each breed class and weight class has been established, the superintendent will split proportionately the number of lambs to be sold within each breed classification.

Steer Classifications will be determined by actual weight. The class split is made at the discretion of the Department Supervisor and may not be exactly equal in number due to weight ranges. A minimum of (3) steers will constitute a class. If a sufficient number is unable to be met, classes may be combined at the Superintendent's or judge's discretion.

Market Steers must be owned, and records kept from April 15th of Current 4-H year.

MARKET STEERS F-4:

Class division will be separated from light to heavy weights:

LOT- 400 Sifted Market Steers

LOT-401 Market Steers per actual weight.

Market Steers that do not grade high good or better will be sifted by the judge from the show and will not be eligible for the sale. Market Steers that weigh under 1000 pounds will be shown in the sifted class. The top weight limit is open. Bulls, Stags, Heifers, Cryptorchid Males, etc. will be sifted. Weigh-in will be at the time specified in the schedule.

LOT 402 Miniature Market Steers

Miniature Market Steers that do not grade high good or better will be sifted by the judge from the show and will not be eligible for the sale. Steers that weigh under 500 pounds will be shown in the sifted class. The top weight limit is 999 pounds. Bulls, Stags, Heifers, Cryptorchid Males, etc. will be sifted. Weigh-in will be at the time specified in the schedule. The number of these steers to be sold will be determined on a percentage basis of the number of overall exhibitors and steers.

LOT- 403 All Other Cattle Breeds Steers

Steers include Longhorn Dairy Breed Steers etc. Steers must be shown with a halter.

All exhibitors must be present to weigh in their Steer(s). Nose rings or leads may be used during the Steer show. Those Exhibitors using nose rings or leads will not be eligible to win the Showmanship Award.

DEPARTMENT F-5 BREEDING BEEF

Each breed will be judged separately. One class for all crossbreeds for each age group will be exhibited.

If the Reserve Champion is unable to compete, then the next placed competitor as deemed by the judge will compete in the Round Robin contest.

At the conclusion of the Showmanship age divisions, a fun showmanship Contest will be conducted for 4-H members who do not own an animal but who would like to gain experience exhibiting a borrowed animal.

DEPARTMENT F-6 GOAT

Superintendent – Quendy Garver

Entries:

- All goats shown must be owned and records kept by the exhibitor beginning on or before June 1 of the current 4-H year.
- All goats must be tattooed.
- Competition is open to registered, recorded, and non-registered animals.
- Exhibitors must be able to show their goat. Collars or chin collars with leads are necessary during the judging of classes or showmanship classes.
- Awards will be made from first through sixth place.

Note: For Bucks – Bucks will be brought in the night before the goat show and must depart the Fair Grounds by the end of the day, the day of the show.

Check In/Weigh In:

All goats will be identified, checked in, and market goats will be weighed at the fair.

Tattoos and tag numbers will be verified at weigh in.

All breeding goats must have a scrapies tag

All goats must be dehorned or tipped prior to check in. Dehorning wounds must be healed by check in time.

Health:

Goats with signs of sickness, lice, ringworm, abscesses, ulcerations, or any abnormality will be disqualified and must be removed from the grounds immediately upon the decision of the goat superintendent.

Supplies and Equipment:

Exhibitors must provide their own animal bedding along with all other equipment and supplies needed to maintain and show their goats.

Fitting and Showing:

At the time of weigh in, market goats must be slick shorn above the hock and knees with hair not to exceed the length of 3/8".

Breeding Goats may exhibit in full hair in the breeding classes.

Angora: The Angora goat should be covered from head to tail and down the legs at least to the knees. The mohair should grow at a minimum rate of one inch per month.

Cashmere: Fiber length is measured in its relaxed (crimpy) state, and must be no less than 1.25 inches (32mm)

A Goat may be entered and shown only in either Market or Breeding class, but not in Both classes. The classes shall include all breeds. A minimum of three (3) animals will constitute a breed class. Classes not meeting this requirement will be combined with another breed class at the Department Superintendents or Judge's discretion.

Market Goats:

- Wether or female (unbred) goats may be shown.
- Male goats must be castrated and healed by the check in date.
- Market goats must weigh a minimum of fifty pounds (50), with a 5lb variance, to be eligible to show.
- Market goats will be required to have horns tipped; no sharp points allowed upon arrival.
- The number of classes will be determined by the weights of the goat and the total number of entries.

Dairy Goats:

It is suggested that exhibitors wear white clothing or dairy colors (black and white) when showing dairy goats.

Animals over two (2) years of age that have never freshened are not eligible to be shown.

Each breed will be judged separately; however, different dairy breeds may be combined in classes when the number of entries does not allow for a separate class for each breed.

Purebred goats will be judged separately from recorded and unrecorded grades.

Recorded and Unrecorded Grades

L-801: Doeling under one year. If entries warrant, class will be divided into two age groups.

L-802: Dry yearling

L-803: One year and under two in milk

L-804: Two years and under three in milk

Registered. If there are not enough animals in each breed to show the breed separately, these classes will be combined into All Purebred.

L-801: Doeling under one year. If entries warrant, class will be divided into two age groups.

L-802: Dry yearling

L-803: One year & under two in milk

Showmanship classes will be brought back to the show ring and will be judged by age category. (Novice, Junior, Senior, Exploration Age, Fun) The Champion novice, junior and senior will compete to be selected the Champion Dairy Goat Showman and compete in the Grand Champion Round Robin Showmanship contest. If the Champion is not available to compete, then the Reserve Champion Dairy Goat Showman will represent the Dairy Goat department in the Round Robin contest. If the Reserve Champion is unable to compete, then the next placed competitor as deemed by the judge will compete in the Round Robin contest.

**** Fun Showmanship**

- At the conclusion of the Showmanship age divisions, a fun showmanship Contest will be conducted for 4-H members who do not own an animal but who would like to gain experience exhibiting a borrowed animal.

Exploration Age (ages 5-8)

L-810 Exploration Age Goat Class (One class for all 5-8-year-olds to be the first Showmanship class of the show. An adult or senior 4-H member must have control of the animal with the participant and accompany them in the show ring.

DEPARTMENT F-7 Dairy Heifers

Superintendent – Lorie Davis

Dairy heifers between 3 months and 24 months of age will be shown. No bulls.

Enrollment in the Dairy Project must have been by May 1 of the current year and ownership of the heifer must have been continuous since June 1st of the current Year.

Formation of classes will be determined by the county Dairy Superintendent after all entries have been received. The classes will be broken according to the birth date of the heifers. When possible, not more than 4 months range in age will be shown in the same class (i.e., Class will contain heifers born January 1 through April 30th). Bred heifers will not be shown with “open” or unbred heifers. Three entries will be needed to constitute a class for award consideration including showmanship.

Classes are as follows:

- Class 1--Spring Heifer Calf, born Jan. 1 - April 30, 2024, weight range 200-525 lbs.
- Class 2--Winter Heifer Calf, born Nov. 1 - Dec. 31, 2023, weight range 400-700 lbs.
- Class 3-- Fall Heifer Calf, born Sept 1 - Oct. 31, 2023, weight range 500-775 lbs.
- Class 4--Summer Yearling, born July 1 - Aug 31, 2023, weight range 600-900 lbs.
- Class 5--Spring Yearling, born May 1 - June 30, 2023, weight range 700-1000 lbs.
- Class 6-- Winter Yearling, born Jan 1 - April 30, 2023, weight range 800-1100 lbs.
- Class 7--Fall Yearling, born Sept. 1 - Dec. 31, 2022, weight range 900-1175 lbs.

- ✓ Heifers in class 6 & 7 must be bred and need certification from exhibitor's veterinarian.

Classes for heifers judged on general conformation will be held. The first and second place heifers from all classes will be eligible for the championship class held after the last regular class. Unruly and uncontrollable heifers will be excused from the ring at the discretion of the judge and Dairy Superintendent.

A showmanship class for Novice, Junior and Senior 4-H members will be held following the Championship class according to the 4-H members age (Novice, Junior, or Senior). *See Department F Showmanship for details.*

Showmanship classes will be brought back to the show ring and will be judged by age category. (Novice, Junior, Senior, Exploration Age, Fun) The Champion novice, junior and senior will complete to be selected the Champion Dairy Heifer Showman and compete in the Grand Champion Round Robin Showmanship contest. If the Champion is not available to compete, then the Reserve Champion Dairy Heifer Showman will represent the Dairy Heifer department in the Round Robin

contest. If the Reserve Champion is unable to compete, then the next placed competitor as deemed by the judge will compete in the Round Robin contest.

At the conclusion of the Showmanship age divisions, a fun showmanship Contest will be conducted for 4-H members who do not own an animal but who would like to gain experience exhibiting a borrowed animal.

Health Requirement by Law

1. New Mexico Origin

- a. Negative Brucellosis test if 18 months of age, unless OCV under 20 months of age and vaccinated between 4-10 months of age.
- b. All sexually intact dairy cattle over 4 months of age are required to have a negative TB test. TB tests will be honored for 120 days prior to showing.

Out of state Dairy Cattle - check with NM Livestock Board or County 4-H office for requirement.

DEPARTMENT H HORSES

Superintendent – Taylor White

4-H Horse Show – Tuesday, July 29, 2025, beginning at 9:00 AM

Classes in the Horse Department are designed to recognize the achievements of 4-H Horse Project members with their own projects and encourage new participants to join 4-H. **(4-H MEMBERS ARE REQUIRED TO SUBMIT HORSE CERTIFICATES ON ALL PROJECT HORSES AS PER STATE RULE.)** The certificates must be filed with the county agent in charge of the Horse project by May 1st of the current year. The horse must be owned and/or managed at least 50% of the time by the 4-H member and records kept from ownership deadline of the current year. Horses that are not owned by the 4-H member must turn in a lease agreement to the 4-H Agent by May 1st.

Family members may show the same horse if it is properly registered for each family member and is shown in separate age divisions. In the event of the loss, injury, or illness, which causes lameness or otherwise renders the horse unfit to show, at the request of the exhibitor and upon approval of show management, one substitution of another properly certified horse will be allowed. Such request and approval must be made at least three classes in advance of the exhibitor's next class and the "one horse one rider" rule shall apply.

AWARDS

High Point Awards will be given to the Senior, Junior, and Novice Exhibitor, based on placing's in classes 1 through 27(show classes) And for classes 28 through 39(Speed Classes). A Champion Showmanship ribbon will be awarded to the highest placed Bernalillo County 4-H member from the Senior, Junior, and Novice level classes.

In order to win a High Point Award, the exhibitor must show in his/her appropriate Showmanship class, either the Western Horsemanship or English Equitation class, and at least one class in the performance section. Points shall be kept on a "one horse/ one rider" basis. Ties will be broken according to placing's in Showmanship classes.

POINTS

Points shall be awarded to each exhibitor and horse team based on the number in the class. If there is only one exhibitor, first place shall receive 1 point; 2 exhibitors, 2 points; up to 6 points. In a class of two exhibitors, second place shall receive 1 point; in a class of three, 2 points, and third place one point; and so on.

No points are awarded for Bareback on a Dollar.

GENERAL HORSEMAN'S DIVISION RULES

When you arrive, please check in with the show secretary's office. All patterns will be posted one hour before the start of the show.

1. New Mexico State 4-H Horse Show Rules of the current year apply.
2. A Championship Showmanship contest will be conducted at the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair. The Champion Novice, Champion Junior and Champion Senior showmen will return to the ring and compete for the overall Champion Showman of the species. The winner will be eligible to compete in the Round Robin Grand Champion Showmanship contest. The Reserve Champion showman of the age category that won overall Champion Showman will then compete against the remaining participants for the Reserve Champion Showman of the species.
3. If a rider scratches a class, he/she must inform the show superintendent. Exhibitors showing other projects at the fair must notify the show secretary in advance. A participant that doesn't notify the show superintendent prior to leaving will be considered scratched from his/her classes which come up during the show. If the participant notifies the show superintendent, the show superintendent will meet with the 4-H Agent in charge of horse and horse show judge. A judgment call will be made to determine if a participant can return to show in his/her classes. Classes may be altered to accommodate for kids out for the show or meeting.
4. An exhibitor must care for and exhibit his own project. **No physical fitting, grooming, warming-up, or riding the horse by anyone other than the exhibitor is permitted on the fairgrounds during the 4-H Fair without penalty to the exhibitor.** Exception: Exploration Age and Novice members may receive assistance from an adult or another 4-H member in fitting and grooming where safety factors and physical limitations are present, but the exhibitor must be actively involved in the fitting grooming, etc. at all times. No riding lessons or coaching is allowed.
5. In the interest of safety, any horse that is uncontrolled in the arena or on the grounds will be asked to be removed from the arena or grounds.

6. The judge or Horse Superintendent can dismiss a rider from any class if they deem the horse to be unsound or unsafe for the rider or others in the arena. Dismissal will result in disqualification.
7. Participants that argue with, or show disrespect to the judge, ring steward or Fair board members can and will be dismissed and disqualified immediately. Show fees will not be refunded.
8. Participants willfully abusing or mistreating their animal anywhere on the show grounds will be dismissed and disqualified, show fees will not be refunded.
9. The project horses exhibited must be owned and/or managed and records kept from May 1 of the current year.
10. Pre-Registration is REQUIRED. Changes (i.e., add/deletion of classes) can be made the day of the show, in coordination with Division Rule #2.
11. No member may spend any night on the Fairgrounds without adult supervision. Staying overnight at the Fairgrounds requires permission from Show Management and NM State Fairgrounds representative.
12. No riding or taking horses outside of designated areas will be allowed.
13. No double riding of horses allowed, no riding in tennis shoes (boots must be worn when mounted), and no loping outside of arenas or designated warm-up areas.
14. No one may ride a borrowed horse during the Bernalillo County 4-H Fair without prior approval.
15. New Mexico State 4-H Horse Show dress code requirements apply for both all classes. Helmets may be worn in any or all classes. A helmet is required for all speed events.
16. Bernalillo County horse program will follow AQHA guidelines for legal tack, dress code and animal treatment, if state 4H rules do not provide specific guidelines for action.
17. Classes will be divided by 4-H Age Group (based on the exhibitor's age as of January 1 of the current year):
 - Exploration Age – 5 to 8 (This age group is not judged and will only receive a participation ribbon)
 - Novice – 8 to 11 (8 and in the 3rd grade, or 9 - 11)
 - Junior – 11 to 13 (11 years old and in the 6th grade, or 12-13)
 - Senior – 13 to 19 (13 years old and in the 8th grade, or 14-19)
18. Bring ALL your tack, equipment, and clothes that you will need for the entire show. Classes will be run as depicted in the premium. COME PREPARED. The Agent/superintendent may change the order of classes to allow exhibitors to participate in other fair obligations.

19. Only the horse and exhibitor may pass the gate when entering the arena. Exception:
Exploration age exhibitor (if necessary)

TIMED EVENTS SECTION

A clearly visible start/finish line shall be provided, and the time will start when any part of the horse crosses the start line and will stop when the horse's nose crosses the finish line.

A helmet must be worn during speed events.

Breaking the designated pattern will receive a "no time". If the horse re-crosses the starting line at any time the pattern will be considered broken, and the run will receive a no time. The judge may disqualify an exhibitor for excessive whipping.

The gate must be closed prior to starting the run and must remain closed until the pattern is complete and the horse is at a controlled walk; **All exhibitors must WALK into and out of the gate. There will be no running through the gate.**

Reruns may be given only due to a malfunction of the timing equipment.
